Dear Friends,

Christian Giving Campaign

PCC MEETING, 10TH JULY 2012

Sue Bale (Chairman) opened the meeting. 11 members were present.

A representative of the Maggs Day Centre gave a presentation on the Centre's work, and took questions. Sue Bale thanked her for coming to see us, and presented a cheque for £1,500 (part of the Church's annual mission giving) towards the centre's work.

The PCC continues to focus on four strategic questions. The first is "Children/youth: How can we increase the involvement of children and young people in our church life?" The Vicar reported on the ongoing work. He is concerned that those who run Children's Church should feel supported. Links with CWLC and the University are developing in a pleasing manner.

The next question is "Outreach/communication: How can we strengthen and publicise our welcoming environment?" Having given this year's major donation to Maggs at this meeting, the charity sub-committee will now decide which other charities should receive from us this year. Maggs will be invited to speak at a service in the Autumn. All agreed that the recent charity presentations in the 10 am service had been valuable: The committee will think about the best way to continue these.

Philip Evans reported on behalf of the Communications Committee that several welcome packs had been issued. Sylvia Render reported on behalf of the Pastoral Committee that their work was going on well and gave some examples, including the healing/wholeness monthly evening service.

There was a brief report on each of the forthcoming events to ensure that the co-ordinators were in place and to cover any strategic questions.

The third question is "The future: how can we improve our financial position so that we are better able to resource our growth?" John Prangnell reported that the Christian Giving campaign had brought an increase in commitments. Forthcoming works around the church were outlined.

The final question is "What do we need to do to plan for the reorganisation of clergy in West Worcester?" The Vicar gave an update. The exercise to suspend the living at St. Clement's has begun. The Vicar said that we need to think about what services are offered (where and when?) and our overall processes and administration. The members of the PCC expressed concerns about Chris's workload. Between PCC meetings, Emma Pound and Sylvia Render have applied for the 2012/13 ALM worship leader course; their applications have been endorsed by the standing committee on behalf of the PCC and forwarded to the Diocese.

Under **Any Other Business**, Philip Evans presented a report about 'Parish Buying' and how this can save us some money. Arthur Burgess tabled a proposal for the agenda of the September PCC meeting about a Garden of Remembrance. There was a discussion and an agreement about how to run the tower tours at the Summer Fayre. A proposal for the Tower Appeal's education budget to provide various alterations to improve the visitor experience in the tower was agreed in principle.

The meeting closed with all saying 'The Grace'.

Many thanks to all who sponsored me during my recent skateboarding challenge.

NEW FORMS OF CHURCH ATTRACTING THOUSANDS EACH MONTH

The Methodist Church says that it has been encouraged by the growth of new forms of church, especially those under the banners of *Venture FX* and *Fresh Expressions*. Recent statistics show that over 40,000 people now attend some form of fresh expression church at least monthly. *Fresh Expressions*, a joint venture with the Church of England, also works alongside a large number of Christian organisations, denominations and streams - both in the UK and overseas.

The *Venture FX* project of the Methodist Church has helped create 13 projects around the country since its launch in 2009, with six more launching in the last year. Ian Bell, *Venture FX* coordinator, says, "From Bermondsey to Colwyn Bay, from Plymouth to Edinburgh, pioneers both lay and ordained are grasping the opportunity to share the gospel where people are."

The *Fresh Expressions* statistics show steady growth in all forms of fresh expressions, including cafe church and messy church. Recent figures from the Church of England show about 30,000 people attending fresh expressions of church who are not otherwise counted in church attendance figures. For most Methodist forms of fresh expressions, a clear majority of those taking part do not otherwise attend church.

MINISTRY AND ORDINATION CANDIDATES

At the end of 2011, there were some 28,955 licensed and authorised ministers, ordained and lay, active across the 12,500 parishes and a growing variety of chaplaincies (in local communities, hospitals, education, prisons and the armed forces) in the Church of England.

The number of people ordained to stipendiary (paid) ministry - 264 in 2011 - has remained broadly stable over the past 16 years. This is compared with almost a three-fold increase in those ordained to self-supporting ministry (89 in 1994 to 240 in 2011). About half (52 per cent) of those ordained in 2011 entered stipendiary ministry compared with more than three quarters (78 per cent) in 1994.

In total, 504 new clergy were ordained in 2011. 464 candidates were accepted to train as future clergy in 2011. The number of readers in training in 2011 was 349.

The number of women clergy, paid and unpaid, continues to rise. In 2011 there were 1,763 women in full-time paid parochial appointments compared with 1,140 in 2000, an increase of 50 per cent over the decade. Women make up over one in five (22 per cent) of paid parish clergy. Women in 2011 made up more than half of both those in self-supporting ministry (54 per cent) and of licensed readers (51 per cent).

AUSTRALIAN CHRISTIANS IN DECLINE

The Australian Bureau of Statistics recently revealed that although Christianity remains the dominant religion in Australia, the percentage has dropped from 63.9% in 2006 to 61.1% in 2011. Meanwhile, the number of Hindus has increased sevenfold and Buddhists have increased fivefold. The recent trend is attributed to a cultural shift in the birthplace of immigrants to Australia; a phenomenon well advanced in European countries.

WORDS FOR WORSHIP

A new book from Church House Publishing aims to re-establish some of Christianity's oldest words of worship into the heart of the nation. *Words for Worship* - compiled by members of the Liturgical Commission - explains the origin of some of the most popular prayers and liturgy used in Common Worship (2000) and the Book of Common Prayer (1662), some stemming from the Bible, others pre-dating the Church of England to medieval and early Christian times.

Words for Worship is ideal for those who already worship regularly and would like to know more about the origin of the words they say; for those who are new to Anglican worship and want a 'tour' of the most popular prayers; and for those who would like a selection of prayers to learn by heart.

As well as unpacking some of the nation's most well-known prayers (such as the Lord's Prayer, Apostles' Creed, the Grace, and Glory to the Father...), Words for Worship includes chapters devoted to the responses and prayers used during Holy Communion (such as Kyrie Eleison, Sursum Corda and the Sanctus).

There are, in addition, explanations of the origins of the *Nicene Creed*, *Gospel Canticles*, modern collects, and prayers from the *Book of Common Prayer*.
