PASTORAL LETTER FOR NOVEMBER

from the Bishop

I have been doing a series of deanery visits this year and I have been very inspired by all the good things that I have seen in the parishes of our Diocese. At the conclusion of each of them there has been an open meeting during which people have had an opportunity to 'grill the bishop'. Some fascinating questions have arisen but the one that sticks in my mind the most came from a hospital chaplaincy volunteer who spoke of the fact that many people in hospital were getting excellent medical care but were not receiving the human care they needed. Indeed, the media were full recently of reports about a new project in the NHS to teach nurses the basics of care.

In one sense this is a terrible indictment of our society. On the other hand, it makes clear a very important truth: that all of us, whatever our training or lack of it, have a great deal to offer to our fellow human beings by virtue of our common humanity. Medical expertise is very important to promoting health and wellbeing but so is human company – and the latter is as crucial out of hospitals as well as in them. The good news in this is that we can all respond to what is becoming a real problem in our society: that people seems to have less and less time to be with one another.

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas again we would do well to remember that the coming of God to be with us lies at the heart of it. 'Behold the virgin shall conceive and bear a son and he shall be called Emmanuel' which means 'God with us' (Matthew 1.23). It is God being with us that counts and it is our calling to be with one another.

Our society tends to be heavily task orientated. This came home to me a number of years ago when I used to take groups of young people to Malawi and arranged for them, as part of a link we had with a mission school there, a visit to the homes of students at that school for a weekend. When they returned and I asked them how they had fared, they would be reasonably positive but at the same time puzzled about the fact that they had not actually done anything. That's because the most natural thing for an African to do with visitors is just to 'be' with them – sometimes to sit and talk and sometimes just to sit. People in our own society, on the other hand, would generally want to arrange all sorts of activities and outings for visitors coming for the weekend.

Being with us is the best thing that God could do for us and being with one another is the best thing that we can do for each other.

MECHTHILD OF MAGDEBURG

Based upon information from Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia **Mechthild** (or **Mechtild**) of **Magdeburg** (c. 1207 - c. 1282/1294), a Beguine, was a medieval mystic, whose book Das fließende Licht der Gottheit (The Flowing Light of Divinity) described her visions of God. Mechthild's writing is exuberant and emotional: her descriptions of her visions are filled with passion.

Definite information about Mechthild is scarce; what is known comes largely from scattered hints in her work. She was probably born to a noble Saxon family, and claimed to have had her first vision of the Holy Spirit at the age of twelve.

In 1230 she left her home to become a Beguine, and live a life of prayer and mortification under the guidance of Dominican friars. Her criticism of church dignitaries and claims to theological insight seem to have aroused some opposition, and around 1270, she joined the Cistercian nunnery at Helfta, who offered her protection and support in the final years of her life, and where she finished writing down the contents of the many divine revelations she claimed to have experienced.

A NOTE FROM THE ORGAN CONSOLE

It is incredible to think that a whole year has passed since I took up the appointment as Organist and Choirmaster here at St John's. My wife, Luise, joined the choir at the same time and, together, we were made to feel welcome and involved from the very beginning. Interestingly, though, my relationship with St John's actually began a good few years ago when I was asked to deputise for Funeral and Wedding services. It was a real joy to be invited to join the church on a more regular basis.

I inherited a very committed and keen choir which was, though, rather small in number. My first aim was to increase this number and I can report that we currently have over three times the membership that we had. This means we can learn a truly diverse range of music and we now sing anthems at many of the regular 10.00 a.m. Communion Services. Soon after I started Chris suggested a second Choral Evensong each month. Encouragingly numbers attending these Evensongs are growing as is the obvious enthusiasm from the choir in learning new settings.

Amongst the many highlights for me during my first year have been Remembrance Sunday, the Christmas Carol Service and the Good Friday Liturgy. It is also a delight to hear the congregation giving voice Sunday by Sunday.

I have really enjoyed getting to know the St John's organ better. I think that it is an inspiring instrument and a real pleasure to play. From the sounds of the quietest strings to the magnificent trumpet it has been a joyous journey of discovery.

So what does the next year hold? More exciting musical activities I hope with new organ pieces being learnt, new choral music tackled and new friendships being forged. With all this activity going on, I am still looking to grow the choir and, if there is anybody out there who would like to give it a go, please do come along to a Thursday practice at 7.00 p.m. in the Blakefield Room. Reading music is not a pre-requisite and choir practices are friendly, fun and full of wonderful music.

PCC MEETING 11th September 2012

Sue Bale (Chairman) opened the meeting with a prayer. 15 members were present. The PCC structures its work around four strategic questions. The first is **"Children/ youth: How can we increase the involvement of children and young people in our church life?"** The Vicar reported the progress on the project for a Deanery Children's and Family Worker. He will bring forward a full proposal at a future date. The Vicar reported on forthcoming activities with CWLC and the University.

The next question is "Outreach/communication: How can we strengthen and publicise our welcoming environment?" John Prangnell gave a charity subcommittee update: The Vicar will arrange for Maggs to take part in a service; John has provided a box to collect items for Maggs. Harvest donations: Perishables will be auctioned; non-perishable items will go to Maggs.

Gordon Templeton reported that the next Communications Committee meeting will discuss the church website and the Christmas letter (probably to be done in cooperation with other churches).

Sylvia Render reported that the Pastoral Committee was going on well with a growing number of people involved. Pastoral care information will be added to the welcome pack.

There was a brief report on the forthcoming events: Songmen Concert, Harvest Supper (6th October), Harvest Festival (7th October, non-Eucharistic Service at 10 a.m.), Autumn Fayre (24th November).

The third question is **"The future: how can we improve our financial position so that we are better able to resource our growth?"** Jane Askew outlined some operational matters related to the tenancy of the flat. We must ensure that the tenant only deals with our agents, Severn Lettings.

Jane issued a financial update and John Prangnell gave an update on VAT refunds; for once a beneficial change! The F&AC has set up a sub-committee to review storage around the church.

John gave an update on buildings work. Recently completed has been decoration of the office and installation of the porch doors. Forthcoming works include decoration of the porch and installation of new signage now that the faculty has been granted. A replacement sound system is urgently needed, but this will cost about $\pounds 10,000$. How shall we raise this?

The final question is **"What do we need to do to plan for the reorganisation of clergy in West Worcester?"** The Vicar gave an update on the Deanery reorganisation. The actual re-organisation cannot start at present, but the Vicar is concerned to support St Clements pastorally and practically. He has met with their Churchwardens, and their PCC will meet on 24th September. The members of the PCC reiterated their concerns about the effect of this workload on Chris, and felt that resource should be bought in to cover the gaps. This PCC has no concerns about working together on administration. There was an open discussion about the implications for services.

Final list of ALM candidates: Philip Evans, Emma Pound, Sylvia Render (all Worship Leader), Catherine Templeton (Pastoral Care). The ALM candidates will be 'commissioned' at the 10 a.m. service on 16th September.

Under Any Other Business, Arthur Burgess mentioned the Festival of Healing on 6th October. He will be there representing Parkinson's. The PCC enthusiastically supported the idea of a West Side Bible Study Group.

The proposal for a Garden of Remembrance with provision for the interment of cremated remains was discussed briefly: Sue Bale explained that this had to go back to the Standing Committee until issues had been resolved with the Council over responsibility for the grounds

Sue Bale gave details of the Autumn Course.

The meeting closed with all saying 'The Grace'.

Powell, who created this Festival, will be pleased to know that his music was creditably rendered in the two part Anthem "Thou will keep Him in perfect peace", and in the hymns "St. Patrick's Breastplate" and "Take my Life."

THE ELGAR BIRTHPLACE MUSEUM – A volunteer's view

Every Monday morning I go to volunteer at the Elgar Birthplace Museum in Lower Broadheath. I have been volunteering here for two years now and it is a privilege to be part of the team at the Birthplace of England's great composer Sir Edward Elgar. Volunteering is fun, varied and enjoyable with friendly staff and volunteers.

My three hour 'shift' begins at 11:00 a.m., welcoming visitors in the Elgar Centre. I take admissions, hand out audio guides and explain the layout of the buildings. I help serve visitors in the Museum shop where we sell everything from postcards to chocolate pianos! Volunteering has given me an opportunity to learn new skills and introductory training is always given. Being an 'Elgar expert' is not essential as a deeper knowledge is soon gained in the Birthplace environment and there are experts to ask if ever someone poses a particularly tricky question!

I have a change of scenery and go to the nineteenth century Birthplace Cottage where Elgar was born in 1857. I greet visitors and answer any questions they might have. Enthusiastic visitors come from across the globe and all over the country and so it often makes for an interesting morning. The Cottage is my favourite part of the Museum – I love looking at the lovely garden with its roses and thatched summerhouse.

The Museum has a full events programme and I get to take part in special events throughout the year. Helping with refreshments, entertainment and the organisation has given me the chance to offer my own skills and experience to the Museum.

St HILDA

St Hilda was born a princess on November 17th 614 and was christened at the age of 13 with her uncle, King Edwin of Northumbria. When she was 33 she became a nun and in time she became the abbess (or leader) of a double monastery (where both monks and nuns lived) at Whitby in Yorkshire. And it was at Whitby, under St Hilda's leadership, that a famous conference was held to decide the date of Easter.



You know that Easter falls on a different day each year, but do you know that at that time the Celtic

churches (in Ireland, Scotland and some of England) used a different way to the Roman Church (in the rest of England and Rome) to work out the date. This meant that in some kingdoms one group of Christians were still keeping the fast of Lent while others were celebrating Easter. The debate went on until finally it was decided that everyone would follow the Roman pattern.
