PASTORAL LETTER FOR MAY

from Bishop David

Amidst that splendid service to enthrone Archbishop Justin that I was privileged to attend, there was a completely unscripted moment. It came in the middle of one of the hymns. The printed order of service contained a particular word, but, audibly, the majority of the congregation sang a quite different one. They weren't correcting a misprint in the text. Nor were they misreading what it said. It was a deliberate choice, and one made for theological reasons.

What has fascinated me is not so much the particular hymn, or even the specific word, so much as that a congregation would spontaneously act in this way. It's surprising because I would have expected most people to simply sing what was written on the page without really giving a great deal of thought to it. Admittedly, we were not an ordinary Sunday congregation. It's hard to imagine a larger gathering of people who have studied theology and who think hard about their faith. But it did make me realise how little attention we often pay to the words that we are singing in church.

When I first came to the Diocese of Worcester as a Bishop I found that often in the middle of a service I could be expected to sing a hymn but somehow there wouldn't be a hymnbook to hand. I started trying to sing as many hymns as I possibly could from memory. What I discovered was that it made me concentrate on the words much harder. It's almost impossible to remember the next line if you don't pay attention to the current one. And if it has made me slightly grumpy about modern hymn books that unnecessarily change a word here or there, it has made me much more attentive to the meaning of what I sing.

So let me offer you a challenge for this next month. When you are singing hymns or songs in church, don't just let the words pass from the book to your mouth without visiting your brain. Think about what you are singing, what it means to you, and whether it expresses your faith in Jesus. And if that means occasionally you're singing a different word than the one that appears on the page, so much the better.

A WORD FROM THE EDITORS

We greet you in the name of Christ. Who are you and why do you request entry?

I am Justin, a servant of Jesus Christ, and I come as one seeking the grace of God, to travel with you in his service together.

Why have you been sent to us?

I am sent as Archbishop to serve you, to proclaim the love of Christ and with you to worship and love him with heart and soul, mind and strength.

How do you come among us and with what confidence?

I come knowing nothing except Jesus Christ and him crucified, and in weakness and fear and in much trembling.

Let us then humble ourselves before God and together seek his mercy and strength.

NOTES FROM THE CHOIR

"There is nothing in the world so much like prayer as music is."

Certainly those of us who sing in the choir would agree with William P Merrill. Music does seem to provide a deep connection with the spiritual, transporting us to a different place. Just as we feel closeness to God when we pray, so we can find that closeness through music. With choral music, though, there is the added element of the words. In a choir it is so important to think especially carefully about text. When we rehearse we work very hard to ensure that our singing diction is good. People need to hear the words we sing so we practise shaping vowels properly and producing clear, crisp consonants. Good, strong breath control underpins all of this.

It is, of course though, so much more than working on our singing techniques. These techniques are only the means to the end and that end is communication. We want to communicate the meaning of everything we sing, in hymns, settings and anthems and help everyone who listens and joins in to experience a renewal of thought and understanding of the messages of God. The music our choir sings is carefully chosen to reflect the themes of the designated readings of the day and the times and seasons of the Church's year.

As Bishop David says, it is so important not to bypass the brain and sing on 'auto pilot' but to use the music to draw us ever closer to God.

I finish with a final thought, the motto of The Royal School of Church Music:

Psallam spiritu et mente - I will sing with the spirit and the understanding also.

And Can It Be that I Should Gain



CHARLES WESLEY

Charles Wesley was born in Lincolnshire in 1707, the son of an Anglican clergyman. He went to Oxford University and while there he devoted himself to systematic study and to the regular practice of religious duties giving rise to the term "Methodists" and the "Oxford Methodist" group which his elder brother, John joined in 1729 soon becoming its leader and moulding it to his own notions.

After graduating, Charles stayed on at Oxford as a college tutor, but in 1738 he decided to take holy orders so as to go with his brother John on an expedition to the colony of Georgia. His stay in America was short and unhappy. He returned to England in ill health thoroughly dissatisfied with himself and in religious turmoil.

In May 1738 his crisis of faith reached its peak and the text, "The Son of God . . . loved me, and gave Himself for me," (Galatians 2 v20) led him to a new and personal experience of faith in Christ on Whit-Sunday, 1738. The date of 24 May is known to Methodists as "Aldersgate Day" and commemorates the spiritual awakening of Charles in 1738.

After experiencing this evangelical conversion in May, 1738, Charles began writing hymns and preaching at the great revival meetings led by the two Wesleys and George Whitefield. For 17 years he made continual evangelistic journeys, but after 1756 he worked mainly in Bristol and London.

Wesley's conversion had a clear impact on his doctrine, and is most notable in his hymns written after 1738. He wrote:

"The Holy Ghost in part we know, For with us He resides, Our whole of good to Him we owe, Whom by His grace he guides, He doth our virtuous thoughts inspire, The evil he averts, And every seed of good desire, He planted in our hearts."

Here in this one short verse we have several doctrinal truths taught to us. We have the personal indwelling of the Holy Spirit, the sanctifying work of the Holy Spirit, the depravity of mankind, and our personal accountability to God. This was a vital contribution not only to Methodism, but to modern theology as a whole.

In April 1749, he married the much younger Sarah Gwynne (1726–1822), also known as Sally. They moved into a house in Bristol in September 1749. Sarah accompanied the brothers on their evangelistic journeys throughout Britain, until at

least 1753. After 1756 Charles made no more journeys to distant parts of the country, mainly just moving between Bristol and London.

Only three of the couple's eight children survived infancy: Charles Wesley junior (1757–1834), Sarah Wesley (1759–1828), who like her mother was also known as Sally and Samuel Wesley (1766–1837) Both Samuel and Charles junior were musical child prodigies and, like their father, became organists and composers. Charles junior spent most of his career as the personal organist of the English Royal family, and Samuel became one of the most accomplished musicians in the world and often called "the English Mozart." Furthermore, Samuel Wesley's son, Samuel Sebastian Wesley, was one of the foremost British composers of the 19th century.

If you are confused by the profusion of Wesleys, so was I! Here is a brief summary: Charles Wesley was:

- The son of Anglican clergyman and poet Samuel Wesley,
- The younger brother of Anglican clergyman John Wesley
- The younger brother of Anglican clergyman Samuel Wesley (the Younger)
- Father of musician Samuel Wesley,
- Grandfather of musician Samuel Sebastian Wesley.

Charles was firmly opposed to all suggestion of separation from the Church of England. Towards the end of his life, he lived and worked in the area around St Marylebone Parish Church and so, just before his death, he sent for its rector John Harley and told him "Sir, whatever the world may say of me, I have lived, and I die, a member of the Church of England. I pray you to bury me in your churchyard." On Charles' death, aged 80, on 29th March 1788; his body was carried to the church by six clergymen of the Church of England, and a memorial stone to him stands in the gardens in Marylebone High Street, close to his burial spot. One of his sons, Samuel, became organist of the church.

In the course of his career, Charles Wesley published the words of over six thousand hymns, many of which are still popular. These include:

"Christ the Lord Is Risen Today" "Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Skies" "Come Thou Long Expected Jesus" "Hail the Day that Sees Him Rise" "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing" "Lo! He Comes with Clouds Descending" "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" "Rejoice, the Lord is King" "Soldiers of Christ, Arise"

NEW ROLE FOR THE BISHOP OF WORCESTER

Buckingham Palace has announced that Her Majesty the Queen has appointed Bishop John to be the next Lord High Almoner. This office dates from at least the early twelfth century. The Lord High Almoner's chief responsibility is to oversee the liturgical arrangements for the Royal Maundy Service, where The Queen distributes 'Maundy Money', a small number of silver coins symbolically representing alms to the poor. Bishop John said of his appointment: "I am honoured to take on this ancient role which is the Queen's personal appointment. I shall be responsible for the Royal Maundy service which is a wonderful reminder each year that the ideal of Christian service lies at the heart of the monarchy, an ideal which Her Majesty the Queen has embodied so wholeheartedly in her devoted service to her people for over sixty years."

The Royal Maundy service used to take place in London but early in her reign The Queen decided that the service should take place at a different cathedral every year. The Queen has distributed Maundy on all but four occasions since coming to the throne in 1952. Today's recipients of Royal Maundy, as many people as there are years in the sovereign's age, are chosen because of the Christian service they have given to the Church and community. During the Service, the Lord High Almoner wears a linen towel round his waist symbolizing the foundations of the ritual by Jesus who chose to wash the feet of his disciples as an act of humility.

Each diocese was asked to send a representative to last year's special ceremony at York Minster to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Roy Peacock, Reader at St. Mary's, Oldswinford was chosen from Worcester Diocese. He said: "I was delighted to be chosen for the work I have done for the diocese - I was a member of Diocesan Synod as far back as 1970 and have served on numerous diocesan and deanery committees. My abiding memory is of how happy the Queen was - at the age of 85 she was beaming the whole time she gave out the coins. It was the best part of the whole thing and much appreciated. We were given 86p - because Queen celebrated her 86th birthday later in the year - the coins were all especially minted for the occasion. It was emphasised that the money was not from the church or the state, but was the Queen's personal gift. I left the Minster with a deep feeling of exhilaration and pride: exhilaration, because I had been present at an uplifting spectacle of pageantry, praise and glory, and pride at the Church's continuing mission to serve the community and the whole of society."

Alongside helping to organising the service on Maundy Thursday, the Royal Almoner also gives the Royal Maundy lecture. The lecture contains a history of the service, explanations of the symbolism and a chance for people to question the Lord High Almoner. Those who will receive the Maundy Gifts from the Queen are especially invited to it - but it is open to all.

TEEN MEETS GOD – LOLA'S STORY

Lola is 19 and lives in Bournemouth. She was not brought up to know Jesus, but gradually, though being with Christians she grew to know and love them, and through them, Christ himself. She told her story to Martin Saunders, a youth worker.

"I came from a family in which no-one knew or wanted to know Jesus. One day my friend invited me to the local youth club at my Salvation Army. I hadn't been involved in a church before so I was a bit cautious. To be honest, at the time I was also a bit of a hand full! But I got to know and love the people there as they shared their lives - and many pizza nights - with me. They impacted me as they seemed quite normal, and yet they were so different.

"Slowly they started to invite me to Christian events and I started one-to-one mentoring, which really helped me at a troubling time in my life. Meeting with a female youth worker for an hour a week to unpack my struggles, learn more about the bible and learning to pray together was amazing. That relationship with my youth workers gave me the confidence to go that summer to the Soul Survivor festival and there I gave my life to Jesus.

"Back at church we got a new youth worker, and we started exploring Jesus in a fresh, different way. I was starting to think about university options, and she introduced me to a load of her friends who were doing creative and quirky things in the name of Jesus in her home town, a town that also had the perfect university course for me! They bake cupcakes for brothels and gay bars; they open the local church on a Saturday night until 4am and fill it with thought provoking art installations. They go clubbing together as a distinct act of worship and lavish love, building relationships with the night-time community.

"Since moving there I have got involved and started taking my faith to a new level, I am hungry for Jesus and want to know more of him. Through my new church and the community I live in, I am sure that I will only continue to learn and love more!"

Lola made a decision to follow Jesus. She prayed, asking God to forgive her for the things she does wrong, and then she promised to live God's way. To find out more about the Christian faith, visit http://www.lookingforgod.com

REPORTS FROM THE 2013 ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

Vicar's review of the year

Dear Friends

We've had a good year at St John's: our congregation has continued to grow, and our Electoral Roll has increased by over 10%. It's unusual these days for churches to be growing, and we can be very pleased at the progress we've made. But! We could have grown even more than we have: the main 'brake' on our growth – and a very real factor holding us back as a church – is the state of our finances. Our accounts are a lot healthier than they were three or four years ago, but there's still work to do.

A Review: Our Goals for 2012

We set ourselves four key areas that we wanted to work on in 2012:

- 1. Outreach/communication. How could we strengthen and publicize our welcoming environment?
- 2. Children/youth. How could we increase the involvement of children and young people in our church life?
- 3. The Future. How can we improve our financial position so as to make us better able to resource our growth?
- 4. Deanery Reorganisation. What did we need to do to plan for the reorganisation of clergy in West Worcester?

How did we do?

- 1. Outreach/communication
 - Our congregation has grown.
 - Our Pastoral Care team are helping us support and care not only for our 'regulars' but also for those on the fringes of church. A couple of examples:
 - The team recently introduced a new service at Regent House and this has been well attended.
 - 'Thursday at Two' our new bereavement support group has grown even in the short time that it has been running.
 - Brian Askew's work as Estates Manager has enhanced the look and feel of the building, making it more warm and welcoming for example, redecoration of the porch and the new glass doors.
 - There's been a real improvement to the quality of our worship: for example, the choir continues to grow, and move from strength to strength.
 - Our ALMs (Authorised Lay Ministers) are beginning to help us develop new forms of worship, reaching out to the local community.
 - *Overall verdict*: a good year, and a great opportunity to build on our progress in the coming year.
- 2. Children/youth.
 - We have slowly been building our links with Christopher Whitehead Language College: for example, the school is now actively involved in our '4D' public debates.

- We are one of only two churches currently supporting 'Café Quench' a new initiative run by the Christian Union at the University, and which acts as a form of outreach amongst students.
- Junior Church has been very active, though numbers remain small.
- We are continuing to explore the possibility of a children's/family worker, though this is making slow progress (in spite of the fact that we have so far achieved about one-third of the funding that we need for the post).
- Overall verdict: this remains a key area of weakness, despite some good progress. Though Junior Church leaders/helpers do a fantastic job, I feel we need to do more to support our children: for example, storage space for Junior Church is cramped; the Blakefield Room isn't ideal for their activities on Sunday mornings, and they're often squeezed by other (no less legitimate) activities.
- 3. The Future
 - Our finances have grown a lot stronger, and we had a very successful stewardship campaign last Summer
 - We've restructured our very successful Finance & Accommodation Committee (F&AC): day to day accommodation issues are now being dealt with by a small group centred on our Estates Manager, Brian Askew; meanwhile the Standing Committee have taken on strategic responsibility for the 'Finance' bit of the F&AC's remit, and have come up with a Recovery Plan to strengthen our finances in the course of a five year cycle.
 - We now have a designated Fund-Raising Committee, working extremely hard to build our financial position.
 - *Overall verdict*: very good progress, but our finances are still fragile.
- 4. Deanery Reorganisation
 - In January I took on responsibility for St Clement's with St David's, and this has inevitably led to a number of major changes for our parish
 - The Diocese have agreed to fund a two year appointment to support west
 Worcester parishes, and Nick Kaleniuk joined us on 14th April.
 - Even with Nick's support, service patterns will have to change, and the PCCs of all three west Worcester parishes recently met and agreed our priorities for worship in west Worcester. We now have a sustainable pattern of worship that will, I believe, help us not only survive but grow as a church.
 - *Overall progress*: early days, but the signs for the future are promising.

Goals for 2013

The PCC met earlier this year to discuss our priorities for 2013, and decided that we should focus on the following key areas, each of which will regularly be monitored in PCC meetings:

- 1. Worship and mission.
 - The PCC set great store by the quality of our worship; already we have tried a number of new ideas, including the use of incense at our Easter morning service.

We have also decided that we must tackle the problem of our sound system – too often the sound-system (or lack of it, or its erratic behaviour!) becomes the focus of our worship. There has been talk of a new family service once per month, as part of our outreach/mission.

- 2. Children/youth.
 - We need to strengthen further our links with the schools, and with the university.
- 3. Working more closely with St Clement's, St David's and St Michael's
 - We need to bring our congregations closer together. Again, we've begun to make progress: for example, we have held a number of joint services, and these have been well attended.
- 4. Finances
 - A strong financial base can help support and build our work in all of the above areas the Standing Committee and the Fund-raising Committee will continue to address our need.

A Time to Give Thanks

The Vicar's report is always an important opportunity to say 'thank you' to all those who give to the life of our church. I'm always afraid to 'name names', because someone always inevitably gets left out – though I feel I must say a particular thank you to our churchwardens, and our PCC for all that they have given, not least those members stepping down this year. Within that, special thanks must go to our Treasurer, Jane Askew, who is stepping down at this AGM: she's done a fantastic job at a difficult time for us financially. Her warmth, energy and commitment have been second to none; she will be a tough act to follow. Thanks must also go to John Prangnell, who has stepped down as chair of the F&AC and from the PCC.

Likewise, a quick word of thanks must also go to our ALMs, who are really beginning to spread their wings and contribute new and fresh insights into our worship.

But what about those who clean the church, who decorate it with flowers, who serve teas and coffees, who welcome people into church, who serve on the Pastoral, Standing, Communications, Charities, and Accommodation Committees? The bell ringers, the organist and choir, the Music Group, the Toddler Group, Bible Study Group, and the Junior Church? The office staff? Those who prepare the Parish Magazine (and those who recently stepped down as editor!). And this is just a part of it – what about all the other jobs, less formal but by no means less essential, that go on behind the scenes? Whatever your contribution, however small: we couldn't do without you - thank you!

These are times of great change for our church - but we are not only 'surviving', we are flourishing. We are all part of something that is growing, and making a real difference in the lives of people. Long may that continue, and long may this be a place where God is worshipped, honoured and served.

Churchwardens' annual fabric report for 2012

Herewith follows a report from Brian Askew, our Estates Manager. This provides a comprehensive review of the work that was carried out in our church during 2012. The churchwardens have nothing material to add to Brian's report and as such are happy to advance it verbatim as the substance of their own official report.

We would add that:-

- There is nothing new to report on goods and ornaments;
- Security for the church office was upgraded in the early part of 2013;
- Due at least in part to government imposed benefit changes, fuel and rent payment obligations for the Flat above the Office have not been fully met by the present tenant. As a consequence, and under the umbrella of an extended grace period, the tenant has been served notice to leave with effect from mid May.

Our heartfelt thanks are due to Brian for his energetic work in ensuring that our buildings remain in good order.

ESTATES MANAGER'S REPORT for 2012

There was a vast amount of work done in the church during 2012 to both maintain our lovely church and enhance some of its facilities. Some of the major items were:-

- After many months of waiting the damp patch finally dried out on the south side of the choir stalls so were able to repaint most of the south wall;
- ✤ As the tower project came to a close we were able to repaint the ringing chamber;
- The old sound system finally gave up so we had to replace the amplifier, hearing loop amplifier and the two radio microphones with their receivers;
- Our rented property in Heron Close had to have a major overhaul as the property had been neglected for many years;
- To keep the church watertight all the roofs were checked over, numerous tiles replaced and all the valleys, gutters and downpipes were cleaned;
- When the roof was checked over it was noticed that the rainwater downpipe on the south side of the Chancel was cracked – so this was replaced;
- Following almost twelve months of building work it was decided to give the church a good clean. A cleaning company came in for about a week and cleaned the church from top to bottom. Some of the higher rafters had nearly three inches of dust on them;
- During a routine examination of the boiler in the Blakefield Room complex it was found to be beyond redemption – so a new one was fitted;
- We had our normal round of fire equipment checks and portable appliance testing;
- The Parish Office complex was looking shabby so we decorated the Parish Office, kitchen area and Priest's room;
- Finally, the porch project came to a conclusion. The porch doors were modified with the glass panels and the porch itself was redecorated – although much plaster fell off and had to be replaced;
- Those of you who have been up on the tower roof will know that the battlements are very low and it wouldn't take much effort to fall off the roof. So, to make the roof safer, a stainless steel safety wire has been fitted around the inside of the battlements. If you look very carefully you can just see this from the ground;
- After what took nearly a year, we finally got permission to upgrade our signage at the back of the church;

One of the major successes of 2012 was getting Worcester City Council to accept that they were responsible, in its entirety, for the old closed Churchyard - to the south side of the church. This was not an easy process and eventually resulted in us getting the Diocesan Registrar to send the Council a 'solicitor's letter' detailing their legal responsibility. Over the coming years this will save the church £000's as the Council are responsible for the grounds, trees, footpaths, fences and boundary walls. We have yet to see any real action on this but the Council have commissioned a surveyor to report on what needs doing so we need to keep the pressure on.

So, as with all old buildings, there is always something that needs doing. Our current focus is on replacing the sound system for one that can be controlled within the church. 2013 is the year when our next Quinquennial Inspection is due so we will wait with bated breath to see what that throws up. You can rest assured that there will always be something for us to spend our money on.

2012/13

The Deanery Synod has met three times since the last APCM. Each meeting consists of a presentation by a visiting speaker followed by updates and discussions about various topics.

We have had presentations from the Diocesan Board of Education; Rev'd Dr. Fiona Haworth about her work as University Chaplain and Rev'd Canon Sheila Banyard about "The Deanery" and what it's for. We have also received a brief presentation from our General Synod representative.

Regular updates are received about: Parish Share and other Diocesan finances; the work of the Diocesan Synod; the work of the Diocesan Mission, Pastoral & Resources Committee; the work of the Diocesan Parsonages Committee and the work of the Diocesan Board of Education.

The Deanery Synod have also discussed the new national fee structure for weddings and funerals held in church and agreed that the issue of Vergers being optional needed to be clarified and requested it be raised at Diocesan Synod. We have also discussed the proposal (from St. John's) for a Children's worker, which received unanimous support.

Remember: We are YOUR representatives. If you agree or disagree with any diocesan or national Church of England policy (or secular policy), please let us know. We can raise it at Deanery Synod and through the Deanery Synod get the issue raised at Diocesan Synod and ultimately at the General Synod.
