PASTORAL LETTER FOR JUNE

from the Vicar and PCC

Dear Members of St John's Church family,

During this celebration of Pentecost it is time once again to ask that we review our financial giving to the church. We all put our gifts to God's use in different ways; we regularly need to ask ourselves how we sustain both our beautiful church building and all the great work that goes on within it and in the wider community.

2012 was a year in which we just managed, through your generosity, to meet our commitments in full. Even so, within the year, expenditure significantly exceeded income. It was a year of consolidation and completing many of the projects started over the past two years. Once again we have seen an exciting growth in our congregation in the last twelve months, with a result that - for the first time in some years – the number on our electoral roll has increased. It is important that we don't lose that forward momentum for lack of funds.

The experience of finding the money for emergency repairs, over the last few years, has shown that we need to plan for the future. In addition to meeting unexpected expenses, we need to be able to cover the increased costs of the day to day running of the church.

To this end we need to increase our regular giving by a minimum of £3015 in total for the year. Bearing in mind we are already six months into the year, in real terms this is equivalent to an average increase, by all 134 of us, (on the electoral roll) of $\pounds 1$ a week. If this were gift aided in every case this would further increase our income by 25%.

To further enhance our income the Fund Raising group is hoping to raise a total of $\pounds 12,500$ (an increase of 47.5% on 2012). To achieve this will require the time and commitment of our talents.

Just as we do in our own homes, we are always looking at how we can reduce our running costs and become more financially efficient. To help in this drive for efficiency, we will be asking you to complete response forms and return them by 2nd June to the box at the back of the church.

Thank you for your time in reading this letter.

REPORT OF THE MAY 2013 MEETING OF ST. JOHN'S TOWNSWOMEN'S GUILD

Our talk was given by Sandy Cale from Worcester Walks. As she was telling us about Georgian Worcester she dressed in appropriate costume.

Sandy began by saying that after the Civil War most of Worcester was devastated, so rebuilding gave Worcester the Georgian style in the 18th and early 19th. Century. In those days the Severn was tidal and many industries were built along the river banks and these began to make an impression on the wealth of the city.

Sandy took us on a journey through the town starting with our wonderful Guildhall and progressing along the High Street etc. and on to the Arboretum. Along the way she mentioned the Crown Hotel in Broad Street and the Star in Foregate Street. These were important coaching inns. If you look up as you walk along the streets she said you can see many examples of the genre still there. In Broad Street is a building on top of which is a dome where people could look out at the views whilst drinking tea which was the new fashionable beverage.

ST ALBAN

Alban was the very first Christian martyr in Britain - or at least the first we know of. A 'martyr' is someone who has died for the faith - the word literally means 'witness'. He was probably killed during the persecution under the emperor Diocletian in the early years of the fourth century, in the late stages of the Roman occupation of Britain. His martyrdom took place in the amphitheatre outside the Roman city of Verulamium, which is now St Albans, in Hertfordshire.



The church historian Bede, writing six hundred years after Alban's death, records that Alban was a Roman citizen (possibly a soldier) who gave shelter to a priest who was being hunted by the Romans. During the priest's stay in his home, Alban was converted to the Christian faith. When the soldiers eventually tracked the priest down, they arrived at Alban's house and insisted on searching it. What they found was Alban dressed in the priest's clothes, while their real prey escaped. They arrested Alban and demanded that he make a sacrifice to the Emperor - a common test of loyalty. He refused. He was then condemned to death and taken into the amphitheatre, which still stands in the fields below St Alban's Abbey, to be put to death. One of his executioners was converted, Bede claims, but the other one took a sword and beheaded him.

He was buried nearby, on a site where a shrine was later erected. In the early fifth century two Continental bishops, came to Britain and record that they visited the shrine of Alban at Verulamium. The date of their visit was given as 429.

The martyrdom of Alban is a reminder that Christianity was planted first in these islands during the Roman occupation, though it was all but extinguished in England in the dark centuries that followed, until people like David, Cuthbert and the other Celtic missionaries restored the faith in many parts of the land - especially in the north. The fact that his shrine existed and was venerated right through to the time of Bede shows that the faith did not die out completely, even in the south of England.

Little is known about Alban apart from the story of his martyrdom, but what we do know is probably enough to give him a substantial claim to be the patron saint of England ahead of the foreigner George. The magnificent abbey dedicated to him in St Albans is a permanent reminder of his place in the nation's story.

REPORTS FROM THE 2013 ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

The above meeting was held in April. Last month we printed: The Vicar's review of the year, the Churchwardens' annual fabric report for 2012 (incorporating the Estates Manager's Report), and the Deanery Synod representatives' report. This month we include edited highlights from the remainder of the reports.

Graham Evans, the PCC Secretary reviewed the work of the PCC:

The PCC met nine times during the year: A short meeting straight after the last AGM to appoint officers, six ordinary meetings, one additional meeting to discuss a specific topic and another additional meeting (in April) for approval of the 2012 accounts and the churchwardens' annual fabric report. We had 17 members (no vacancies) and usual attendance at the meetings was 12 to 14. The Vicar's review of the year (*printed last month*) covered the four questions around which the PCC focussed its work, the January review of progress, and the new priorities for this year.

The PCC carries out its work through a number of sub-committees. Until January 2013 there was a Finance and Accommodation Committee: This was then divided into two separate committees to cover finance (as part of the Standing Committee remit) and Accommodation.

John Prangnell reported on work of the Finance and Accommodation Committee (F&AC): up to its division in January 2013:

The past year has seen a period of consolidation and further development of the activity of the F&AC. Yet again note must be made of the very significant contribution made by our two part time post holders of estates manager and parish administrator. Both have really helped us as a church to work in a more systematic manner in matters of buildings and administration, relieving the Vicar of some of the problems that arise in these areas and making his vastly increased role more manageable. Through our estates manager, we have progressed aspects of work on our church as set out in our asset management plan (AMP). The AMP has brought into sharp focus the major issue of the continuing shortfall in our income each year as compared with our outgoings. In the past we tended to deal with accommodation problems on an ad hoc basis as they arose; now, with the AMP, we are required to think ahead and find the funding to resolve problems in a managed, coherent way. The major task now for the Standing Committee is to find ways of ensuring that 'the living church meets the cost of the living ministry' that is, we need to make sure that our collections, planned giving, donations and fund raising events meet the cost of the day-to-day running of the church and any priorities for development while also putting aside sufficient funds to pay for our repairs and maintenance.

From Graham Evans' report on the work of the Standing Committee:

The PCC has always had a Standing Committee, to set the PCC agendas and with the power to act for the PCC between PCC meetings. In response to the financial challenges set out in the F&AC report, the strategic financial responsibilities have also been placed onto the Standing Committee. The overall financial strategy is to strengthen our financial position by £20,000 per annum over the next five years. This will be done mainly by seeking to increase our income, although we will also keep a keen eye on our spending. The work so far has highlighted a number of strong fund raising possibilities. To take these forward, a fund-raising committee (as a formal PCC subcommittee) has been formed. The Committee is also developing other fundraising/finance initiatives (not covered by the Fund Raising Committee). The Standing Committee and the PCC reviewed the process for budgeting and the actual budget figures for 2013.

Gordon Templeton reported on the work of the Accommodation and Communications Committees:

This report should be read in conjunction with the F&AC report and the Churchwardens' Annual Fabric Report (*published in the May magazine*), which describes buildings works carried out during 2012 and the early part of 2013 under the supervision of our Estates Manager. As can be seen, there has been an extensive programme of maintenance and improvement. The February 2013 PCC meeting agreed that the installation of a new sound system was the highest facilities improvement priority for 2013. Accordingly a target replacement sound system has been selected and a faculty application submitted. That PCC meeting also agreed to the appointment of Architects for the Quinquennial Inspection, which is due to be undertaken later in 2013. The Tower Project is now deemed to be complete, with control over outstanding works and funds to be returned to the PCC.

The Communications Committee has been pretty quiet during 2012! The main specific communications achievement has been the revamp of the church website. Thanks are due to Philip Evans for his sterling work on this. We again ran a Christmas Services door-to-door letter drop across the whole parish in December. This time we involved other West Worcester churches to produce an ecumenical letter. While take-up from other churches was limited, the reach of the letter was nevertheless extended from the 3900 houses in our own parish to a total of about 6500 houses including much of Dines Green and some of St Clement's parish.

Looking forward, the Communications Committee in its present form will be disbanded. Individual roles effectively deliver communications across a

variety of channels – the weekly newsletter, the Parish Magazine, the website and links to the local press when required. The intention is that future new communications activities will be project driven – a group of people will be constituted to initiate any new activity until its successful launch or execution.

Sue Bale, Catherine Templeton, Jane Askew provided a report on the work of the Fund Raising Committee:

This year has seen the formation of this committee, the PCC having identified that funds need to be raised for the church and that all functions and events need to be co-ordinated.

We have a full programme of events for 2013 planned including concerts, bridal fair, beetle drive, bridge days, craft evenings and the old faithful Summer and Christmas fairs. Those held so far have proved to be successful, with the bridal fair already planned for 2014. However, we are keen to have ideas from the entire congregation to be able to offer a wide range of events that will appeal to everyone.

We have felt that money could be raised from outside sources along with encouraging the congregation to meet for fellowship and friendship. For some time discussions have been made about forming a Friends of St John in Bedwardine group. We are in the process of finalising the details and we should have this up and running within the next six months.

We thank everyone who has supported us so far. If you have any fund raising ideas, or events you would like to see held please come and see one of us as we need to be looking into planning for 2014.

Sylvia Render and Catherine Templeton reported on the work of the Pastoral Care Group:

Over the past year the pastoral care team has continued to offer support to members of the congregation and visit if they are unable to attend church services. We visit care homes and sheltered housing in the parish, offering communion and companionship and we contact families who have been bereaved offering telephone support and visits if requested.

Our latest venture is "Thursday at Two" where recently bereaved people are invited to have a cup of tea and home-made cake. This has been running for two months and the numbers are growing. We have a wonderful group of volunteers who are willing to help with washing up and baking cakes. The Healing service continues to be well supported and on average has a congregation of 15. The pastoral care team serve tea and cakes which are offered after the service From the report on the work of the Children's Church:

Over the past twelve months Children's Church has continued to struggle with low numbers. However, those who do attend have continued to show us that this part of Church life is very important. We do not have enough children to be able to split into 2 groups of different age ranges but the older children within the group prove to be very willing helpers with the younger ones. When the children are asked what they would like to do they are keen to develop a 'messy church' approach and we are investigating this. During 2012 the children have been involved in family services, Mothering Sunday and Father's Day were two that they took an active part in. A very successful Christingle making session was arranged and the children made the Christingles for the service. The day ended with a popular Macdonald's lunch. During the Advent period we saw a rise in our numbers and the children performed for the congregation a Christmas story, from a cat's perspective. They had the chance to show their talents again by performing at the ever popular Christingle Service. The Christingle service is always well attended and perhaps is a time we need to promote our Children's group. Philip Evans kindly showed the children around different aspects of the church to enable them to learn more about our own church. We have taken an active part in the Church's summer and Christmas fairs. We need to try and build our numbers but also to appreciate the important role the children who attend have on our Christian life.

We thank all those who help and support our group. We always welcome new helpers or anyone who would like to take a leading role in this group.

From the report by Nicki Sysum, the Ringing Mistress:

The Bedwardine Guild of Change Ringers, a.k.a. "St John's Clangers", has had a fantastic year in 2012. Our band has grown, and our ringers are getting better by the day! Notable events included:

- We rang for the Olympic torch on Thursday 24th May.
- Monday 4th June. Ringing of Rounds and Call Changes to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee
- 24th of July, St Johns Clangers joined the rest of Worcester in sounding out the bells to mark the start of the Olympic Games.

2012 also saw St Johns Clangers coming into the 21st Century and joining the social media site Facebook. The plan for this Facebook group is to widen the doors of the tower and give everyone further insight into what goes on and invite anyone who wants to give bell ringing a go. We hope to develop the Facebook group (facebook.com/groups/sjclangers/) further and promote it as much as possible to assist our current ringers, and bring in more.

Our band has grown in 2012 by visits from Brownies, Scouts, and opening our doors and having special practice nights for beginners. This has been a fantastic step forward for us, and we have a lot of young ringers. In 2013, I would like to reach out even further to the younger generation. School trips, open ringing, group outings etc.

We all know that bell ringing can be seen as something of an octogenarian occupation. We are bucking the trend in our tower, having a range of ages from 5 to 75. With an enthusiastic social secretary we are going back to the roots of bell ringing as a truly sociable pastime by ensuring the eating and drinking establishments of St John's are regularly frequented. There have been ringing outings and trips, well attended and enjoyed by all. We have had a wonderfully successful 2012 with lots of opportunities for special events, and look forward to a promising and well anticipated 2013.

From the report by Peter Yates on the Music Group:

The Music Group has continued its ministry of supporting worship through the year both within the standard pattern of Sunday worship in church and outside with such outdoor events as the Good Friday Procession of Witness. Co-operation with the choir has continued on a number of the "Major Feasts" of the church year, re-introducing some old material and providing the occasional new item - notably in the form of responsorial psalms. The monthly Healing Service is now part of the regular pattern of services. Continuing co-operation with the "other half" of Mixed Blessings has also been a feature of the year. Christmas is an especially busy time in that regard including making our annual contribution to carol singing in the City Centre and putting together various carol based events beyond the church itself. The parish of St Thomas at Crown East keep inviting us back once a month to assist at their family service - so we must be getting something right there! Outside the confines of worship various music group members have contributed to such events as providing music at the Parish Summer Fare and Christmas Fair, and even contributing to similar events in other City Parishes. We have been very pleased to welcome to our number a bass player this year, and there is always scope for other members of the congregation to join in with our less formal style and fellowship based approach to music-in-worship.

From the report of John Brierley, the Organist & Choirmaster:

I began as Organist and Choirmaster in October 2011 when I inherited a small but dedicated choir of five voices. My main aim from the outset has been to build up the choir both in numbers and in the amount and range of music that they sing. In this way they provide a growing lead and support to the congregational singing whilst offering more choral music in worship. The choir is growing steadily and we now have a membership of around 17 adult voices. We need some more basses.

We meet on Thursday evenings at 7.00pm for 90 minutes including a short break. We have a 9.30am warm-up practice on Sunday mornings. Morale is high and we enjoy our rehearsals where we work hard but also have fun. The choir sings on most Sundays at the principal morning service, twice a month at choral evensong and at major festivals during the Church's year. The choir is available for weddings. We took part in the Wedding Fair in March. I choose hymns and other choral and organ music for the services. Taking the seasons, themes and readings of services as a starting point, I try to reflect these, where practicable, in the music.

We continue to build and I am always delighted to hear from singers interested in joining the choir. I thank Chris Stuart, the choir and the people of St John-in-Bedwardine for their friendship and support.

From Hilary Clifton's report about the Friendship Group:

We have had a very mixed year, and unfortunately, it may prove to be our last as I no longer feel that I can cope with the responsibility of running it. We did have some very enjoyable evenings. Our speakers included Betty Hayler telling us about her Life as an Army Wife, followed the next month by her husband Bill putting his side of the story, telling us what Army Life was like for him. Arthur Burgess amused us with 'A funny thing happened to me on the way to.....', Jill Bowen gave us an interesting talk on Guiding, and Peter Holzapfel entertained us royally, as usual.

Unfortunately both outings had to be cancelled, the April one because of flooding, and the June one as we could not get enough people to cover the cost of the coach. The party had to be cancelled because of snow.

I do hope that someone will volunteer to take over from me. I joined when we were called the Young Wives Group, which became the Wives Group (when we were no longer young!) and then the Friendship Group when we were joined by an unmarried lady (Eileen Dowling for those who remember her!). There are now several men who join us, which is brilliant.

We have met on Wednesday evenings, (the last in the month) at 7:30 in the Blakefield Room. Our business finishes by about 8:45 when we stop for coffee and biscuits.

I do hope someone will volunteer.

FROM THE PARISH MAGAZINE ARCHIVES

A letter from Bishop John Mort printed in the June 1953 magazine.

John Mort was Vicar of St John's 1948-1952, and then bishop of Nigeria.

We have an extensive archive of our historical Parish Magazines stretching back to the 1870s. If you'd like to obtain a particular copy or view a copy from the archive, please email edofficer@ stjohninbedwardine.co.uk "Mr. Dobson, a native of Herefordshire and for the time being resident in Nigeria, has told me that he is willing to visit Worcester and give you this short message. This is really good of him and I am glad to feel that one who has become a true friend to me here will be coming to see you. I almost feel that I am coming back to see you myself! Though it is still a long way off—leave will come some day.

"It is rather difficult to keep up with correspondence as I am moving about a great deal but I am very thankful for the good wishes and greetings which I have received from time to time. I have often thought of the happy days which I spent at St. John's. Sometimes I burst out enthusiastically and tell friends like Mr. Dobson about you. I know you have been thinking of me, for some of that spirit of friendship and goodwill which we enjoyed so much in the Parish is beginning to be apparent here. In the symbol of the magnificent Crozier—already greatly admired by all who have seen it—lies the assurance of your kindness and interest which I shall always remember and appreciate.

"The Church, as you can well imagine, is faced with a hard struggle here. The work is as yet so new to me that I do not think it would be correct for me to formulate conclusions at this stage. There are difficulties and troubles but there is much to lead me forward in high hopes. I look forward to giving you all news of the place, if I may, when eventually my leave comes around. You would be highly amused if you saw the "Bishop's Palace" as my friends term it. After the comfort of St. John's Vicarage, it must surely be good for me to live in such a place. But here again there is very encouraging news. A nucleus of European and African friends are meeting at Kadurna, the Northern capital, in an endeavour to find some way of establishing a fitting episcopal headquarters. This gesture, even in the attempt itself, symbolises support, friendship and encouragement to me personally.

"With regard to information about the country, Mr. Dobson will. I am sure, be pleased to answer any questions. I know you will have an interesting meeting. There is an old saying—'The world is a small place.' One of the first things which Mr. Dobson said to me was—'You came from Worcester? Did you know Dr. Bunting?' The name of the revered Doctor immediately established a link between us. I am sure you will be glad to know that I am very happy and confident in the realisation that I may be allowed to do a little good here.

"This comes to you with my very kindest greetings and good wishes. I shall rejoice to learn on my return that St. John's is more flourishing than ever.


