PASTORAL LETTER

Worcester International Festival for Young Singers

WIFYS, the UK's first-ever non-competitive international youth singing festival, comes to Worcester this summer. The festival runs from Friday 19th July to Saturday 27th July. Organised by Sing UK in association with the European Choral Association - Europa Cantat (ECA-EC), the city will play host to 11 choirs from 10 different countries - Belgium, Poland, Spain, the Czech Republic, Austria, Russia, Hong Kong, Germany, Lithuania - and the UK.

Street singing, concerts in the city and county, singing at church services and a Welcome Concert will delight singers and audiences. The climax will be the final night's **Gala Concert** in Worcester's magnificent cathedral, with all four of the week's distinguished international conductors, directing the young singers in performance. The programme will include the **World Premiere** of a specially commissioned work from UK composer **Bob Chilcott** (*Five Days that Changed the World* with words by Charles Bennett), which will be conducted by the composer - and will involve all 400 young singers!

With the festival being the first event of its kind in the UK, we have taken as our theme, '*Peace & Unity between Nations'*, to reaffirm the continuing mission of ECA-EC, and our own shared aspirations - to work towards a more peaceful world through the engagement of young people from different nations coming together to sing.

BISHOP DAVID TO BECOME NEW BISHOP OF MANCHESTER

Downing Street has announced that the Rt. Rev'd David Walker, currently Bishop of Dudley, is to become the 12th Bishop of Manchester. Bishop David will leave the Diocese of Worcester in October to take up his new post.

Bishop David said: "Whilst I am very excited about returning to my home city as Bishop, Sue and I will also be sad to leave so many friends that we have made



in the Diocese of Worcester. I'm grateful for the many opportunities that I have been given both to support the mission and ministry of the Church of England in Dudley and Worcestershire and to contribute to the life of our villages, towns and communities."

Bishop John said: "Although I shall be very sorry to lose a wonderful colleague from our diocese, I'm delighted that Bishop David has been appointed as Bishop of Manchester. As anyone who knows him will be aware, he is a person of great gifts, immense wisdom and deep personal holiness. I have reason to be profoundly grateful to him - I could not have wished for a better colleague during the last five years. The Diocese of Manchester is very fortunate, as is the wider church and I shall be joining very many others to pray for God's rich blessing upon David and Sue as they prepare to move and in their new life and ministry."

There will be a service to celebrate and give thanks for Bishop David's ministry in Worcestershire and Dudley in Worcester Cathedral during October. The process to appoint a new Bishop of Dudley will begin immediately.

THE GIRL GUIDES' PROMISE

You may have seen in the press that the Girl Guide movement is changing the nature of the promises its members make when they join, replacing an explicit promise to "love my God" with one that says a Guide will "deepen her personal beliefs". We thought you might be interested to read Bishop David's reaction to this.

The editors

"I suppose you might expect that as a church leader I would be saddened by the decision that the Guides have made, but I'm not. The first problem with the promise in its old form was not that it said anything wrong, but that it was so widely ignored by those who made it as to have lost any force. It had become the very opposite of the vows I hear being made enthusiastically at ordinations and confirmations. And the second problem was that in many Guiding groups, though certainly not all, there was little effort on the part of the leaders to help the girls keep the vows they had made. Again, this is the very opposite of what happens at Confirmations and Ordinations, where the congregations express loudly and clearly their support for the candidates in their efforts to keep their vows. And where I know, as bishop, they will continue to do all they can by way of support in the years that follow. My hope then, for the Guiding movement, is that the new promise to deepen personal beliefs is one that each Guide will take seriously as she makes it, and each Guide leader will be committed to helping those in her charge to fulfil. Then the vows will be more like the ones I hear at Confirmations and Ordinations. And my challenge to each of you reading this letter is that you will reflect for a moment or two today on the vows that you have made and pledge yourself to keep them, and seek, where you need it, help from others to keep them."

ST SWITHUN

Swithun was Bishop of Winchester from his consecration in October 852 or October 853 until his death on 2nd July sometime between 862 and 865. However, he is scarcely mentioned in any document of his own time. His death is entered in the Canterbury manuscript of the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle under the year 861. His signature is appended to the witness lists of several Anglo-Saxon charters



More than a hundred years later, when Dunstan and Æthelwold of Winchester were inaugurating their church reform, Swithun was adopted as patron of the restored church at Winchester, formerly dedicated to Saint Peter and Saint Paul. His body was transferred from its almost forgotten grave to Æthelwold's new basilica on

15th July 971, and according to contemporary writers, numerous miracles preceded and followed the move.

The name of Swithun is best known today for a British weather lore proverb, which says that if it rains on Saint Swithun's day, 15th July, it will rain for 40 days.

St Swithun's day if thou dost rain For forty days it will remain St Swithun's day if thou be fair For forty days 'twill rain nae mare

A Buckinghamshire variation has

If on St Swithun's day it really pours You're better off to stay indoors

Swithun was initially buried out of doors, rather than in his cathedral, apparently at his own request. William of Malmesbury recorded that the bishop left instructions that his body should be buried outside the church. In 971 it was decided to move his body to a new indoor shrine, and one theory traces the origin of the legend to a heavy shower by which, on the day of the move, the saint marked his displeasure towards those who were removing his remains. This story, however, lacks proof, and is at variance with the 10th century writers, who all agreed that the move took place in accordance with the saint's desire expressed in a vision. Another suggestion is that the legend was derived from the tremendous downpour of rain that occurred, according to the Durham chroniclers, on Saint Swithun's Day, 1315.

There is a scientific basis to the legend of St Swithun's day. Around the middle of July, the jet stream settles into a pattern which, in the majority of years, holds reasonably steady until the end of August. Thus, whatever the weather around the middle of July, this pattern will probably continue until late August.

TEEN MEETS GOD – BECKY'S STORY

Becky is 18 and lives in South London. She told her story of how she found faith in God to Martin Saunders, a youth ministry specialist.

'I grew up in a Christian home' is the easiest answer to give when asked about how I met Jesus, but nowhere near the most accurate or justifying statement about my walk through faith. Although I followed my parents' routine of church every week while I was growing up, a routine was all that church was before I found God for myself.

When I was 13 (in School Year 9), my youth leader started a cell group for people my age. It wasn't until I went along to that group that I began to question and think about what church was really about, and that there was much more to faith than what I had been exposed to. It made me realise that God was greater and bigger than I had understood, and that anything could be brought to him in prayer.

Year 7 of school wasn't a great year for me; there had been certain people who had bullied me through primary school who didn't let it go once secondary school commenced, and things weren't too great at home either. It made me upset, hurt and angry, but when I looked back at it during a cell group session, I didn't ever remember desperately praying or offering the situations to God, which was a very different response to how I would act now.

Overall there was no direct turning point for me meeting Jesus, but the company and encouragement of great leaders really helped me find myself as a child of God, not just a child of my parents and their faith. Since then I've been blessed with an amazing journey and opportunities, through summer festivals and through challenges I feel God has set me for myself, more recently involving mending a broken relationship with my mum, and taking a gap year out of education to fully focus on him and seek his plan for my life.

- Election of Treasurer: John English (unopposed).
- Confirmation of Standing Committee: Agreed to be The Vicar as chairman, lay vice-chairman, churchwardens, treasurer, secretary and associate priest.

Under Any Other Business the meeting received updates on the Sound System, the Summer Fete and the new service pattern.

PCC MEETING 5th June 2013

Sue Bale (Lay Vice Chair) opened with a prayer. 13 members were present.

Under **Worship, Mission and new services,** Nick Kaleniuk reported that the first 'Worship for everyone' service at St Clement's had gone very well, with great support by the YMCA to the breakfast provision. The Pastoral Committee reported on their work and Luise Horrocks was elected to the Charity Committee. Philip Evans reviewed the Deanery Mission. It was agreed to hold similar outreach events in St John's in future, if there was someone prepared to take the lead for each event.

Philip Evans reported from the project group to advertise the new service pattern. The Vicar said thanks should be recorded for this group: Philip Evans, Margaret Morris, Amy and Chris Rees, Jo Dowling (St Clement's), Ginny Harrison (St David's), Nick Kaleniuk (who thanked Philip for his leadership - and the biscuits!)

Under **Children and Schools**, the Vicar reported that he had been exploring the possibility of a Children and Families Worker for 18 months. He had got some funding, but not enough, and he has established many contacts and relationships which have been fruitful in various ways. However, he felt that this should no longer be the mainstay of our Children and Schools policy.

There was a discussion about the new St John's family service, which will be based upon the St Clement's Worship for Everyone. It will be launched in September.

Nick Kaleniuk suggested that we should explore the idea of a Summer Holiday Club with the Christian message as a key element. He is willing to co-ordinate this. There was a discussion around ways to take this forward and tap into useful contacts and the experiences of the previous 'Kings Squad'. It was agreed to support the principle of this and to ask Nick to explore it further.

Under **West Side collaboration**, the Vicar said that there will be an interview on 28th June for the person proposed to replace Nick Kaleniuk. If selected, this person will not be able to start until October time, so we will have to deal with the consequences of a gap between Nick leaving and the new person starting.

Philip Evans presented the proposal for a shared Church Office developed by the ALM administrators from St John's and St Clement's. The Vicar noted that the principle of sharing office facilities had already been agreed by this PCC, and commended this as a good and well researched report. It should be eligible for the diocesan transitional grant. Sue Bale expressed a reservation that the joint office might not operate in a team fashion. Acceptance of the report was agreed (The Vicar abstained, none against).

Under **Finance and Operations**, written reports had been received from a number of PCC committees. Highlights from the written and verbal reports included:

- There had been a good response to the Christian Giving campaign in terms of the number of responses received; the financial effect had not yet been calculated.
- The Treasurer distributed a June financial update and answered questions. His summary of the position was that it looks okay, but there are still some significant unknowns (outcome of the Quinquennial inspection and costs for the flat). The PCC approved payments of Parish Share.
- The Fund Raising Committee (FRC) reported on their on-going and future events. The Vicar said how impressed he was with their work.
- Friends of St John's: The FRC tabled the proposed Terms of Reference and leaflet for the Friends Scheme. There was a discussion about various aspects of the Friends and what we should offer them and the launch was agreed.

The Secretary briefed the PCC about Chancel Repair Liability (CRL) and the need for some PCCs to take action to research and register this by October 2013. The Diocese have asked us to rely on information from the Church Commissioners (CC) showing that the CC accept 100% of the CRL for our chancel and it was agreed therefore that it was reasonable for the PCC to take no further action about CRL.

Under Any Other Business, the PCC agreed the papers for the recruitment of a replacement in the Parish Administrator post.

The meeting closed with all saying 'The Grace'.
