

LETTER FROM THE (soon to be) ARCHDEACON OF WORCESTER

Nearly venerable?

There are many, shall we say, eccentricities about the Church of England, and not a few surprises, not least that archdeacons are known in their title as Venerable. Why venerability is seen to apply to archdeacons alone, I do not know. As my dad said when I told him this about my new appointment, 'I don't think I can take that seriously.' And I agree with him; 'hardly venerable' seems nearer the truth. But maybe that's a good thing: taking ourselves too seriously is always dangerous!



It has been a humorous conversation point, along with the comments about drains and gutters. Archdeacons are closely involved in the care of church buildings, which might seem tedious to some. Certainly it involves business and planning meetings. But it is a practical care, alongside the pastoral care of clergy and lay people in the parishes. I take it to mean that I will be more intimately involved in encouraging local Christian presence, in both people and buildings, and I'm looking forward to that.

This new ministry begins for me on Sunday 16th November with a service in the cathedral at 4pm. Please pray for me, and come if you can! I have been overwhelmed by messages of support and good wishes since the announcement. Hearing from people in parishes where I've worked, I have realised something else: When you move on from one post to another in the Church you think that you leave much behind, but in fact you take much with you. In these past few weeks I have had a sense of gathering up so many experiences and relationships, of belonging to the extended family of the diocese.

There's been much made of the 'Ice Bucket' challenge in the media recently. I'm thinking my ice bucket challenge begins on 17th November. But there's also a 'thankfulness' challenge doing the rounds of Facebook, where you have to list three things you're thankful for each day. So I thank God for

- the community of the Church in this diocese, expressed in all your kind greetings;
- the committed presence and engagement of Christians locally in the parishes;
- and the gift of humour, taking God seriously enough, but not ourselves!

A WORD FROM THE EDITORS

Welcome to our October edition. The name of this month is derived from the Latin word for eight and eight is considered an auspicious number in Chinese and other Asian cultures. That seems an appropriate thing to reflect on in this month when we celebrate harvest, but also consider the suffering places in the world where we can only wish and pray for their future prosperity. You will see there are plenty of events this month, including some related to harvest – and there's information about how we can respond to our relative good fortune by giving to others or reflecting and praying about some of the suffering places in our world.

Following the eight theme, we thought of "Eight maids a milking" which suggested our historic Christian figure, St Brigid of Kildare, the patron saint of milk-maids

2014 SHOEBOX APPEAL

Since 1990, Operation Christmas Child – an initiative of the Christian relief and development agency Samaritan's Purse – has been blessing underprivileged children around the world with gift-filled shoeboxes wrapped and packed by children and adults in the UK. It's a campaign that thousands of schools, churches and other organisations from



across the UK get involved with between September and November each year. In fact, it is now the UK's largest children's Christmas appeal.

The idea is simple. Children and adults wrap and pack shoeboxes with a range of gifts and take them to a convenient 'drop-off point'. We collect these gift-filled shoeboxes and, after processing for export purposes, we send them overseas where local churches distribute them to children, on the basis of need alone. Each shoebox is an unconditional gift, given to a child with nothing asked for, or expected in return; no pledges, no obligation to go to church or attend classes; 'no strings attached'.

These shoebox gifts are an expression of God's love to us, and the gift of His Son Jesus at Christmas. They give local churches the opportunity to show God's love to children in a tangible way and, during the distribution event, to share the Good News of Jesus Christ, perhaps through age-appropriate music, dance and puppet shows, or through a little book of Bible stories The Greatest Gift, distributed with the shoebox, not inside it.

This year we will be again supporting this very worthwhile cause. The idea is that you fill a shoebox with items suitable for a boy or girl age 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14. There are items that should not be included, to check look on the website www.operationchristmaschild.org.uk , pick up a leaflet from church or phone 424811 for more details. Each box requires a donation of £3 to help with transport costs.

If you feel unable to fill a box but would like to help, Children's Church will be packing boxes so you can send in any suitable items. Boxes need to be sent into church before the 10th November, if you need them collecting phone 424811.



In Chinese, the word for "eight" sounds similar to the word which means "prosper" or "wealth" In regional dialects the words for "eight" and "fortune" are also similar.

There is also a visual resemblance between two digits, "88", and 囍, the "shuāng xǐ" ("double joy"), a popular decorative design composed of two stylized characters 喜 ("xǐ" meaning "joy" or "happiness").

The number 8 is viewed as such an auspicious number that even being assigned a number with several eights is considered very lucky.

In 2003, A telephone number with all digits being eights was sold for CN¥2.33 million (approximately £230,000) to Sichuan Airlines in Chengdu, China.

The opening ceremony of the Summer Olympics in Beijing began on 8/8/08 at 8 seconds and 8 minutes past 8 pm local time.

PUBLICITY OFFICER JOB DESCRIPTION

We are still looking for someone to get involved in the work of the church by becoming our Publicity Officer. This was mentioned in last month's magazine, but there was insufficient space to print the whole Job Description.

The Publicity Officer will have responsibility for creating publicity stories as well as dealing with queries that relate to publicity or the public perception of the church.

The Publicity Officer does not have to do everything themselves. A key part of the role is to liaise with and co-ordinate others who may be helping with parts of the role. The Publicity Officer will need to liaise closely with the Fund Raising Committee.

Type of post: VOLUNTEER. **Time requirements:** Flexible – the job can mostly be done by email or telephone without being tied to a time or place.

Responsibilities:

- Press Releases
- External advertising of events (e.g. posters, banners & leaflets)
- Electronic communications
 - Keeping the Events pages of the website up-to-date
 - Maintaining the church's "A Church Near You" pages (including the calendar)
 - Advertising for seasonal and other special services (Newspaper adverts & Parish letters)
- Noticeboards: External and Internal (including the Blakefield Room and Cottage)
- Ensure communications use the church's brand identity

Resources:

Budget: Up to £500 p.a.

Expenses: All significant expenses to be agreed with the Treasurer beforehand. Stationery: Paper and stationery can be ordered via the Parish Administrator. The post holder will be provided with an official email address.

Type of person:

We are looking for someone with excellent communications skills, who is well organised and comfortable with computers (Word-processing and email).

Please think if this might be something you could get involved with, even if you haven't taken a formal role in the life of the church before. NOTES FROM THE CHOIR



After introducing two of the ladies from the choir in recent months, it is the turn this time for one of our tenors to have his say and Philip Evans very kindly agreed to answer some questions for me. Philip has been part of St Johns for many years, singing in the choir for the last 19! He has recently been on a 3 month placement, spending time in 4 churches across 3 parishes and I was interested in his experiences during this and during his time over the years in St Johns Choir.

Have you seen lots of changes over your years in the choir? I started out as the only boy treble with 5 girls but more boys joined and I eventually became Head Chorister, sitting at the front and singing the solo in Once in Royal David's City in the Carol Service. The choir did go through a phase of shrinking but now, as a mixed adult choir, it has grown once again which is very exciting.

Tell me something about the music in the churches you visited. *None of the 4 churches have a choir and all depend more on piano accompaniment than organ for the most part. Cotheridge church is particularly interesting as they have a strong tradition of singing Anglican Chant with every one of the small congregation joining in and relishing the lovely acoustic. One of the most moving experiences was in Knightwick Chapel where David Sherwin led the service on the guitar and the sun was streaming in from the open door. Although only the size of the Burroughs room, the Chapel was filled with sound of about 30 people singing together and enjoying praising God in song.*

After these experiences how do you now feel about singing in the St John's choir? Singing in 4 part harmony in not the norm in the churches I visited and I really appreciate coming together with others who are committed to their singing and enjoy it so much. The current rejuvenated choir is continuing and maintaining a wellestablished tradition, which is great.

A BIT MORE ABOUT ROBERT JONES

In the September edition, we published the information that Robert Jones will be the next Archdeacon of Worcester. As promised, here is some more information about Robert.

Robert has been a priest in the Diocese of Worcester since he was ordained in 1980 and is currently Director of Development.

Robert is well-known throughout the Diocese of Worcester, having served as Vicar of St. Francis in Dudley for eight years and then as Rector of St. Barnabas with Christ Church in Worcester for fourteen years. He was also Rural Dean of Worcester East, is a Canon of Worcester Cathedral and served as one of the diocesan representatives on General Synod, the Church's governing body for ten years. He was appointed Director of Development in 2006 where he has been responsible for training of clergy and laity throughout the diocese, establishing the popular Authorised Lay Minister programme, which has trained over 300 people.

Bishop John said: "Robert's appointment was made with the unanimous recommendation of the advisory group set up to find the next Archdeacon of Worcester. He is a very gifted a well-loved priest who is very mission-minded and fulfils all the criteria of the role. At a time when we've had a number of senior appointments from outside the diocese, Robert's appointment will help provide stability as we move forwards as Kingdom People."

Robert said: "I am very much looking forward to this new role within the diocese. As Director of Development, I've got to know clergy and laity from all corners of Worcestershire and Dudley and know that there are some great initiatives happening as our churches reach out to their local communities. It'll be great to get more involved in these at a local level, and be able to provide support and encouragement across the parishes of the Worcester Archdeaconry."

Robert moved into the Diocese from just over the border in Birmingham when he was young and was confirmed in St John's, Halesowen in 1966. He studied languages at University before he trained for ordination at Ripon College, Cuddesdon and, as a fluent German speaker, is very involved in the diocesan partnership with Magdeburg and the Church of England's Meissen Agreement with the German Protestant Church. In his spare time Robert enjoys the odd pint of beer, walking, singing in a choir and music-making.

Robert will be installed as the next Archdeacon of Worcester during Evensong at the Cathedral on Sunday 16 November at 4pm.

ROOM HIRING AT THE CHURCH

The church has two meeting rooms and a large space in the church available for hire. All rooms have access to the church car park.

Blakefield Room	Suitable for up to 30 people: Fully fitted kitchen, including dishwasher; toilets, including one disabled toilet and a baby-changing facility; Tables and/or chairs.
Burroughs' Room	Suitable for up to 12 people. Drink making facilities and toilet. Television with VCR provided.
The North Aisle	Suitable for 120 people seated theatre style or up to 48-64 seated around tables. Tables and/or chairs are provided. It is a large open area with plenty of electric sockets. It has been used to host exhibitions, meals and conferences.

All access to the church is level and therefore suitable for wheelchairs. A toilet for the disabled is available.

PRIORITIES FOR 2015

The PCC met on 15th September. Part of the meeting (reported below) was to set priorities for 2015. The summary of the rest of the meeting will be in the next edition.

In thinking about our 2015 priorities, these were some of the points made:

- Make sure our buildings are fit for purpose
- Serve our community
- Help new Christians

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- Make "Outreach" a main priority which can encompass much of what we want to do
- Keep "Children and schools" or even make them two separate priorities
- Retain "Worship, Mission and new services", "Children and Schools" and "West Side collaboration" and add "Providing value to the community"
- More work on the existing priorities

The Vicar summarised that these ideas fell into two headings:

"Outreach and serving the community" and "Children and Schools and Christian Nurture". The first of these will include understanding the community, social concern, value to the community, creating a buildings vision (to make our buildings fit for purpose to serve our objectives) and embodiment of West Side Collaboration as collaborating on projects.

ST BRIGID OF IRELAND

Irish folklore says that Brigid came from a village near Kildare, of parents of humble origin, and was baptised by Patrick and became a nun at an early age. She is credited with founding the monastery of Kildare, a powerful influence for Christianity in Ireland.

Brigid, you could say, was the female Patrick of Ireland.

Historical facts about this first abbess of Kildare may be scarce, but her "Lives", written from the 7th century,

tells many anecdotes and miracles which over the centuries have become deeply rooted in Irish folklore.

The miracles attributed to Brigid show her to have been a woman of great compassion and generosity. There are stories of how she could multiply food, especially butter, for the poor. Other stories tell of her changing her bath-water to beer, in order to satisfy the thirst of unexpected visitors. Even her cows gave milk three times the same day, to enable visiting bishops to have enough to drink. Hence she is the patron saint of milkmaids.

Brigid's cult grew rapidly in Ireland, where it became second only to that of Patrick. In England, there were at least nineteen ancient church dedications in her honour (the most famous is St Bride's Fleet Street). There is also St Bride's Bay, Dyfed, which underlines the strong connection between Irish and Welsh Christianity. St Brigid is patron of poets, blacksmiths, and healers. She is sometimes depicted with a cow lying at her feet, which recalls her phase as a nun-cowgirl.

EMERGENCY UPDATE

The news internationally – and also at home – is terrible. Below are items of information about two major causes for concern which particularly affect our communities. These are the growing antisemitism here and in Europe, and the plight of Christian minorities in the Middle East. Please can I ask you to pray, and to offer practical and vocal support if appropriate. We would also be keen to hear of local communities who are in need of practical support.

Antisemitism

This has included recent attacks on synagogues attended by and led by our own CCJ members, including Muswell Hill and Brighton and Hove Hebrew Congregation.

Christian minorities

From the Vicar of Baghdad: I have just returned from a secret visit to Qaraqosh – once the largest Christian town in Iraq, but no longer. Today, Qaraqosh stands 90 per cent empty, desecrated by the gunmen of the fanatical Islamic State terror group now in control. The majority of the town's 50,000 people have fled, fearing that, like other Christians in this region, they will be massacred.

Statements by religious leaders:

The Chief Rabbi:

"I offer my deep sympathies and full, unreserved support to the Christian and Yazidi communities in Iraq, who are suffering at the hand of those who distort Islam and in its name bring death, destruction and misery. As we are witnessing in Iraq and elsewhere the denial of freedom of religion in such a brutal manner is antithetical to everything we stand for.

Archbishop Justin Welby:

"In a globalised world where even distant nations are our "neighbour", we cannot allow these atrocities to be unleashed with impunity. And while the behaviour of the ISIS jihadis in Syria and northern Iraq is particularly savage, it is also part of rising and increasingly serious persecution of Christians and other groups in many countries.

"These [jihadi] groups are, rightly, rejected by the vast majority of Muslims. The struggle being faced is one for a world that can cope with diversity, and disagree without destruction. ISIS, Boko Haram and their equivalents seek only destruction for their own ends.

KNIT A POPPY



Last year, many of you will remember helping to make, buy and sell poppies for November 11^{th} – we managed to raise £700 for the British legion. This year, by starting early, we have £200 raised, 200 poppies in stock and 200 patterns out with knitters, so our target is £1000. To maximise the effort we are making

wreaths and also making a specific task of 118 poppies, one for every name on the war memorial (to the men of the First World War) in the churchyard.

Please help in whatever way you can. I will be in church on Friday mornings 10-12noon from September 26th to knit, sell, receive, give out patterns and save wool which has been donated by WCH Housing Association.

On October 31st at Gheluvelt Park, there is a service and ceremony for the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Ghulevelt in which soldiers of the Worcestershire Regiment lost their lives; some of the 118 above will have been at that battle. I will be there to show and tell with 118 poppies.

Thank you for whatever help you are able to give.
