

LETTER FROM THE CURATE

Dear Friends,

As I write this letter we are exactly half way through Lent. Signs of new life, in the form of Daffodils and other Spring flowers, are beginning to show, and thoughts are turning towards the joyful message of Easter. But what is that message – to me, to you, to society in general?

For Christians Easter is the "Raison d'etre" of our faith, without which we are lost and all our other major celebrations and festivals are empty and meaningless.




Without Easter, Christmas becomes just the birthday of another illegitimate child who grew up to be a deluded dreamer and Pentecost becomes the ravings of a group of possibly drunken men! With Easter, we are turned into a people with a loving relationship with our Creator God; a people who know themselves to be loved and forgiven; a people with a certain hope for both the present and the future; a constant companion to guide and keep us. What a difference a day makes! Or does it? Are we "Easter people" full of joy and eager to share our good news with others or are we more like the women who according to the original ending of Mark's Gospel "fled from the tomb ... and said nothing to anyone"?

In our politically correct society where we must respect all and risk offending none, many Christian values and observances have been lost and, sadly, I think that Easter is one of the main victims of this. Ask any young person under the age of thirty and, unless they come from a family who regularly attends church, I am confident that they will have, at best, a very sketchy idea of the Easter story, much less see any personal relevance in it. And yet the message of Easter is incredibly personal to anyone and everyone who will allow it to be so. When I was eleven I was given a copy of St John's Gospel and in John 3:16, where the text reads:" For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life" a space was left in place of the word "Whoever" for me to write my own name. At that moment, Christianity – and the amazing significance of Easter – became personal to me. Try it – it is incredibly powerful!

As part of my role on the Chaplaincy team for the YMCA I have been setting a weekly quiz through Lent and I wanted to include a picture round. On Google Images I went through 53 pictures of "cute" rabbits, chicks and chocolate eggs before finding a remotely religious image and even then it was a cross largely obscured by flowers! Image 173 bore the message "He is risen" but could easily leave one wondering "Who is – the bunny or the chick?" It wasn't until image 316 that I found a picture clearly indicating Christ rising from the tomb.



Surely it is the empty tomb which most accurately symbolises Easter and all that it offers each one of us.

The slogan "Jesus is the reason for the season" is one usually associated with Christmas but this year let's make it our Easter refrain – spread the word, send Easter cards, give "Real Easter eggs" which at least:

have the Easter story printed on the box. Let's make it our business to put Christ back into Easter as we shout it to the roof tops:

The Lord is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

OUR CHURCH

St John-in-Bedwardine Church is an active Anglican church which has its roots in the Norman period. The church is open daily, as a haven of peace at a busy road junction in the St. Johns area of Worcester.

The church was originally built in 1165 as 'The Chapel of St John' – the parish church then being St. Cuthbert's in Lower Wick. When the church of St Cuthbert's was demolished in 1370, St John's became the parish church.

MORE ON THE CHARITIES WE SUPPORT

CINNAMON TRUST

KEEPING MAN AND BEST FRIEND TOGETHER

Many of us know the sense of companionship and comfort involved in sharing our lives with a pet. Often, in old age, a cat or dog may be the only source of company for those who have lost loved ones or live far away from their children. However, as age advances it can become more difficult to care for a much loved pet. Dog walking can be a major problem for some elderly people and many give up their pets because they are no longer able to get out and about.

The Cinnamon Trust works to keep the elderly or terminally ill and their pets together for as long as possible, providing volunteers to carry out tasks such as regular dog walking, taking animals to the vet, or undertaking short term fostering if owners have to go into hospital. Knowing that someone will be there to care for a much loved pet provides the reassurance which many people need. They are then able to enjoy the company of their pets, knowing that their basic needs will be met.

I recently began volunteering with the charity and have received my first dog walking assignment. The arrangement provides a perfect match- many of the volunteers, like myself, would love to own a dog, but find that a busy life makes it impossible. I can spare the time, however, to help out with Charlie, and I'm sure I benefit as much if not more than he does!

Why Cinnamon?

The Trust was founded in 1985 by Mrs Averil Jarvis whose determination and dedication has ensured that the manifest need is fully addressed.

Just as Mrs Jarvis was starting her work to develop the charity, her beloved Corgi, Cinnamon, died in her 17th year. It seemed appropriate to name the Trust in her memory.



WORCESTER SNOEZELEN

Worcester Snoezelen is a multi-sensory leisure therapy centre specifically for people of all ages who have disabilities. The charity was founded in 1993 when the Community Care Act saw people who had learning disabilities moving from long stay institutions & hospitals into the community.





The Worcester Snoezelen centre was created in order to fill the gap in specialist leisure provision for this section of the community. The centre has 4 multi-sensory rooms, a hydrotherapy pool, and a comprehensive arts and music service. Snoezelen staff members enable carers and families to get the most out of their sessions. We also run weekly activities such as Rock School, Activity Wednesday, Sports and Drama Club. On alternate week Sundays we run an open session for families who have disabilities.

The Worcester Snoezelen ethos focuses on ability rather than disability and potential rather than limitations. We have found that with an open approach and quality resources, experiential learning can happen effortlessly. The multi-sensory rooms are designed to stimulate the senses. The rooms include a warm waterbed, twinkly fibre-optic lights and projections, an aroma fan and soothing tranquil music. These rooms are an oasis for relaxation.





The music and arts services are very popular and provide an opportunity for community engagement. For some of our members music is integral as an outlet for expression and as an aid for communication.

350 people a week travel from all over the Midlands (Gloucester, Birmingham, Hereford etc.) to enjoy Snoezelen services because they do not have access to this provision within their own area.

The people who use Snoezelen services are a vibrant and diverse section of the community. Some may have Downs Syndrome, others Cerebal Palsy, Autism, or chromosomal syndromes. What everybody has in bundles is enthusiasm and we are privileged to share some very precious moments.

MAGGS DAY CENTRE

The manager and staff of the Maggs Day Centre would like to thank all of those members of our church who have loyally supported the work of Maggs over recent years by placing items of clothing, food and toiletries in the grey Curver box by the church door. Our continuing support as a church provides a fine example of one practical way in which we attempt to live out the teaching of the Gospel and care for the homeless and socially isolated of Worcester.



For those members who are unaware of its work, Maggs offers:

- MAGGS DAY CENTRE a direct access Day Centre offering food, shelter, support, washing/shower and laundry facilities;
- THE ACTIVITY CENTRE The Centre runs skills training to help people manage their lives better, such as reading, writing, cooking, art, together with the social skills necessary to reintegrate back into society and;
- MAGGS CLOTHING PROJECT providing free clothes, bedding and domestic items to those in need or hardship across the city.



Maggs Day Centre is primarily for the homeless of Worcestershire. It is a welcoming, safe haven for those who are roofless to take care of their personal hygiene needs, have a substantial meal, get advice, social interaction from others in the same position or to just sit and have a warm drink in safety. Also welcome at Maggs are those who feel socially isolated, for whatever reason they

may feel unable to go to somewhere socially and meet people. They are made welcome and are able to have a meal at the centre.

AFRAID, ALONE, IN PAIN



Loko's choice in life is simple: 'If I can't collect firewood, my children will die.'

Four times a week, in a remote corner of Ethiopia, Loko makes a back-breaking eight-hour trip to gather wood. It's a task she dreads, but she steels herself to do it because if she doesn't her children will starve.

She prays to God as she walks. 'I ask him to change my life and lead us out of this,' she says.

Just £5 could give Loko a loan to start her own business buying and selling tea and coffee, freeing her from her desperate task and allowing her to spend more time caring for her family. This Christian Aid Week, you can help transform the lives of women like Loko.




Our thanks go in particular to Jenny for so ably organising the event and to the cheerful and hardworking band of 15 volunteers who helped to make it such a joyful occasion.

NOTES FROM THE CHOIR

Having interviewed a representative from each of the four voice parts for this column in recent months, I thought that it was the turn of the Organist and Choirmaster, John Brierley, to have his say.

What made you first start learning the organ?

As a very small boy I used to go to church
with my mother and I was fascinated by the
organ from day one. I loved the huge range of
sounds it made and just wanted to dive in and
find out how it all worked!



Tell me your thoughts about the St John's organ:

Well this organ is a very flexible instrument coping well with many different styles of music. It also has a very comfortable console, which is not something that can be said of all instruments. It is a good solo instrument but also works well accompanying the choir.

Do you have a favourite composer?

It has to be J. S. Bach. I love the skill and economy in his compositions and also the fact that his music is so expressive.

What are your other musical interests outside the church?

Well I play the flute and the piano and I particularly enjoy accompanying singers and instrumentalists. I conduct Bromsgrove Choral Society and for the last 6 years have arranged and directed the live music for the Worcester Rep's outdoor Shakespeare in the Commandery's productions. I have also worked in Musical Theatre.

Having been organist and choirmaster at St John's for just over 3 years now, what are your impressions of the place?

I love the way the church is at the heart of the community and that it remains open during the day for people to drop in. There is always so much going on during the week and I particularly like the approach to worship taken by Chris and the team. I have thoroughly enjoyed supporting this work, choosing the hymns and the choral music to complement the themes of the services. It has been great working with the choir, which is making real progress in terms of growth and musical output. Of course new members are always welcome and I know that anyone who is keen to join would be made to feel very welcome.

My thanks to John for sharing his thoughts with me.

ST GEORGE

It's perhaps typical of the English that they should have a patron saint who isn't English, about whom next to nothing is known for sure, and who may not have existed at all. That didn't stop him being patriotically invoked in many battles, notably at Agincourt and in the Crusades, and of course it is his cross that adorns the flags of England to this day.

It's most likely that he was a soldier, a Christian who was martyred for his faith somewhere in Palestine, possibly at Lydda, in the early fourth century. At some point in the early centuries of the Church he became associated with wider military concerns, being regarded as the patron saint of the Byzantine armies. There is no doubt that he was held as an example of the 'godly soldier', one who served Christ as bravely and truly as he served his king and country.



The story of George and the dragon is of much later date and no one seems to know where it comes from. By the middle ages, when George was being honoured in stained glass, the dragon had become an invaluable and invariable visual element, so that for most people the two are inseparable.

However, it's probably more profitable to concentrate on his role as a man who witnessed to his faith in the difficult setting of military service, and in the end was martyred for his faithfulness to Christ.

St George's Day presents a challenge and an opportunity.

The challenge is to distance the message of his life from the militarism and triumphalism that can easily attach itself to anything connected to soldiers and fighting. The opportunity is to celebrate the ideal of the 'Christian soldier' - one who submits to discipline, sets out to obey God truly, does not avoid the inevitable battle with all that is unjust, wrong and hateful in our world, and marches alongside others fighting the same noble cause. 


