#### LETTER FROM PHIL BRADFORD

Last month I visited Tvrdoš Monastery in southern Bosnia and Herzegovina. The Serbian Orthodox church in the complex technically dates from the fifteenth century, but neglect and conflict mean that the majority of the brightly-coloured frescoes which cover its internal walls have been painted in the last twenty years. It was an interesting enough place, but what really captured my attention was the monk who showed us round. All my previous encounters with Orthodox monks (especially in the Holy Land) have involved sullen characters who seemed bored by life and irritated that anyone should dare to intrude into their boredom. It was thus unexpected to discover that this fifty-something Serb was one of the most jovial people I have ever met. His complete lack of English – and our near-total lack of Serbian – proved no barrier to his enthusiastically and smilingly showing off his church and explaining the meaning of all the different frescoes. Friendly and obviously passionate about his calling and his monastery, it was hard not to follow his example as he bounced demonstratively around.

That I was so surprised to encounter a cheerful monk is telling. Even in the twenty-first century, there is some residual part of many of us which somehow expects monks to be religious, and all too often being religious is associated with being serious. When school parties come into church, their teachers nearly always tell them to be respectful and insist upon quiet. Religion – and by extension church buildings – is a cause for solemnity, its priests and practitioners expected to maintain a certain gravity. Thus when I was asked to write about fun, my first reaction was a combination of bemusement and panic. Nowhere does the ordinal mention this as a topic I am required to consider. Indeed, it has to be said that fun does not feature prominently in the Bible or many religious texts. There is plenty about feasting and parties, but I am hard-pressed to think of an example of outright enjoyment. We certainly don't tend to think about Jesus having fun. Think about the numerous depictions of him in classical religious art, and at best he appears with a benevolent, serene look. The great artists never give us a smiling Jesus, let alone a laughing one. Seriousness seems to be ingrained into the faith.

Yet how often do we record our own experiences of fun and enjoyment? If you look at historical memoirs or diaries, it is the moments of tragedy (continued opposite)

(continued from opposite) and crisis which are dealt with in far more depth, since those are occasions we struggle to process. Very often, the fun takes place as part of the everyday that we see no need to record since it is an integral part of our lives. If the Gospels do not record Jesus enjoying himself, it seems hard to believe that anyone fully human could not find pleasure in life, even if in an ephemeral way not noted by the chroniclers. After all, there is much in life to enjoy, yet all too often, even in a liberated, enlightened age, too many people seem to see enjoyment of life as somehow inappropriate, at least in a church context. If – as Christians believe – life is a gift from God, then surely it is something for us to appreciate and enjoy rather than lament and treat as a series of tests? We have been given a beautiful world, and we have been given other people to share it with. To take pleasure in their company, to recognise the joys of fellowship and companionship, is surely the essence of being human. After all, it foreshadows the heavenly banquet to which we are all invited, and in that sense we are called to recognise the happiness in life as well as the seriousness, to invite others into the joy of church fellowship and make known the good news of God's kingdom.

#### A WORD FROM THE EDITORS

Welcome to our July 2015 edition. Given the importance of the St John's Village Fun Day as a community and Church event, it seemed an easy decision to set our theme this month as "fun". However, as you will read in the magazine, this was a theme which some contributors found they had to wrestle with – but as a result they made us think more deeply about "fun"; and to realise how central fun is to being human – as Phil puts it "surely [life] is something for us to appreciate and enjoy rather than lament and treat as a series of tests?"

We have included a number of fun and good news items for you to appreciate and enjoy. There is the Fun Day itself coming, and also news of other enjoyable events. Our archive piece shows that the church has long been involved in fun events "only loud and happy laughter from the time we left Worcester until we returned". But notice the next bit "our hearty thanks are due to those who arranged things so well": These things don't just happen, they need people to arrange them. Please read the Vicar's letter on page 10 and think whether you could suggest or run an event.

So how does the piece on page 17 about Srebrenica (it is 20 years since, on 11th July 1995, 8,372 men and boys were massacred there) fit into a theme of fun? Because, as you can see on page 18, amid their sorrow the people of Srebrenica respond to their hard times - show their essential humanity - by dance, music, drinking coffee together and humour.

We pray that our fun day will draw together people in our community, and that those having testing times may nonetheless be uplifted through fun and enjoyment.

#### **OUR CHURCH**

St John-in-Bedwardine Church is an active Anglican church which has its roots in the Norman period. The church is open daily, as a haven of peace at a busy road junction in the St. Johns area of Worcester.

The church was originally built in 1165 as 'The Chapel of St John' – the parish church then being St. Cuthbert's in Lower Wick. When the church of St Cuthbert's was demolished in 1370, St John's became the parish church.





#### **PSALM 23 - MODERN LANGUAGE EDITION**


The Lord and I are in a shepherd/sheep situation, and I am in a position of negative need.

#### REMEMBERING SREBRINICA

It is 20 years since, on 11th July 1995, 8,372 men and boys were massacred by Bosnian Serb forces during the civil war which began following the disintegration of Yugoslavia in 1991. Having previously been declared a UN 'safe area', Srebrenica was defended by only 400 Dutch peacekeepers, and after several unheeded requests for a NATO airstrike, the city fell to Serb forces. Serb commander Ratko Mladic declared that he intended to take revenge for the rebellion of the Dahijas in 1804. This was a Serb uprising which had been brutally supressed by the Ottomans, who ruled the region at the time. Fearing for their lives, thousands of Muslim men and boys attempted a 63 mile march to the nearest safe territory, but thousands were killed during the journey. Over the next ten days, over 8000 men and boys were forcibly separated from their wives and families, herded into a variety of locations ranging from warehouses to football stadiums. Women and girls were transported to camps where they suffered rape and sexual violence committed on such a scale that confirms its use as a deliberate tactic of war rather than an inevitable by-product. It is estimated that up to 50,000 women were raped, the youngest victim being just 12 years old.

The charity, Remembering Srebrenica campaigns to have the genocide remembered and to tell the stories of the individuals involved, as well as seeking to challenge those who deny that a deliberate act of genocide took place. I recently attended an event hosted by Worcester University in which representatives from the charity spoke about their work. We heard from Robert McNeil MBE, who worked as a forensic technician in Srebrenica. He told us how, after the conflict, the Serbs had removed many of the bodies from the mass graves and reburied them in multiple locations as a way of disguising the crimes. The task of the forensic team was to 'repatriate' these body parts so that loved ones could bury their relatives. They also gathered evidence to prove that the men had been killed deliberately, finding that many had been blindfolded, with their hands tied behind their backs. The work of the forensic team was traumatic, strenuous and physically dangerous as many of them succumbed to dysentery, working all the way through very hot summers. To help him cope with his experiences, Robert Mc Neil had begun painting and many of his paintings were on show in Worcester's library, The Hive.

My invitation to attend this event came because I am responsible for co-ordinating the Lessons from Auschwitz programme at my school. Essentially, Remembering Srebrenica wants to develop a similar programme, arranging visits and working with schools to raise awareness. I was struck and saddened by the similarities between both acts of genocide and the process of remembering them. In one sense, the sense of time only, the events of Srebrenica are much rawer. The emphasis is still very much on stressing that a genocide did take place. Indeed, a verdict is still to be reached in the case of Mladic, and controversy still rages over whether the UN (continued overleaf)

(continued from previous page) effectively sacrificed Srebrenica and whether more could and should have been done by the international community. The process of remembering has distinct parallels. We now have a national Holocaust Memorial Day and the work of organisations such as the Holocaust Educational Trust ensures that every school receives excellent support in the area of Holocaust Education. However, in the immediate aftermath of the war it was not so easy to discuss what happened. Many who were not directly involved simply didn't want to listen, and those who were found it at times almost impossible to tell their stories. The impact of the individual testimonies at the Adolf Eichmann trial is indicative of this. Holocaust education in schools, at least as guided by the HET, tends to stress the role of individual stories. It does not diminish the horror of what happened, but the HET is very keen to respect the dignity and individuality of the victims, almost giving back some of what they were denied in death. Attending the event in Worcester, I felt that there was still a long way to go for the victims of the Srebrenica massacre. The emphasis was very much on persuading the world to first of all remember that it happened at all, before the process of remembering individuals could begin. There is hope however, that, in this 20th anniversary year, and with the UK Parliament's recognition of 11th July as a day of remembrance, that process can now begin properly (see www.srebrenica.org.uk)

#### RESPONDING TO HARD TIMES IN SREBRENICA

[This document was created during a workshop in Srebrenica. It's too long to reproduce in full; you can find the full article by searching online for "Responding to hard times in Srebrenica" Notice how most sections say "some" whereas the section on humour says "many". The editors]

Here in Srebrenica we know about hard times. In 1995, the genocide that took place here was devastating and its effects continue. If you look around the city you can see the damage everywhere. There is high unemployment and much poverty. Then there are the problems of human pain. Not everyone who was missing has been found. Many families still do not know what happened to their loved ones. Here in Srebrenica, we know about hard times. But we know much more than this.

During this week, we have been talking about some of the special skills and knowledge of Bosnian people. We have shared stories of some of the ways we have responded to hard times here in Bosnia Herzegovina. We hope these are of assistance to others who may be facing significant hardship. These are some of the ways we respond to hard times here in Srebrenica. This is some of what gets us through.

Becoming a better person: For some of us, losing our loved ones the ways in which

we did has changed us. I didn't say goodbye to my uncle before he was killed. And this has made me determined to be a better person. .....

**Prayer:** In tough moments, some of us turn to prayers. This means a lot to me. When I ask God to give me strength to go on, I feel his presence and it helps me.....

**Dance as a freedom of movement:** When hard times are around some of us turn to movement, to dance. To me, dance is a form of freedom. .... The feeling of dancing is fantastic. That sense of freedom is like I am in heaven.

**Music:** ... Music brings comfort and that atmosphere that everything is going to be fine. That's what happens to me when I start to sing and my body feels warm again.

A special place: For some, a special place that we return to again and again. ....

To be in nature: Some of us turn to nature. ....

**Appreciating the small things of life:** Sometimes when you have lost people you love it makes you appreciate life more. It makes you appreciate existence. ....

**Rituals of memory:** The mothers of Srebrenica have a religious ritual of memory and healing.....

**Drinking coffee together:** In the morning here in the neighbourhoods women come together and drink coffee. It's a big process and ritual. The cups we use, how we pour the coffee, how we share it, what we talk about, all of these things are important.....

**Humour:** For many of us, it's humour that carries us through. In toughest moments, when I am with my friends, I act totally unserious. I twist the story around so everything turns to be funny. It is my way of escaping from the situation so I can see it more clearly later. I remember when I was a child that everyone around me used humour in situations of strong emotions. For example, if I was very angry they teased me so I would get more angry! If my mother is angry at my father she tells that to him through a joke. She also does that with me. I think this is a part of Bosnian culture, we always make jokes about bad situations. No matter what happens we laugh.

Another one of us also spoke about humour. Every evening I like to watch a Spanish soap on television. It's quality humour. Srebrenica is small and claustrophobic sometimes. When things get depressing it makes a difference to me that this show is on every evening. It is something to look forward to everyday. It's like a medicine. There's a particular character in the show that I can relate to. He is always in trouble, unlucky. He has all kinds of problems like I have, financial, with women, with no women! And he has a funny face. There are plenty of traditions of humour here. Sometimes we put in a lot of effort in order to make other people look ridiculous. I remember when I was young we would set people up with fictitious dates. We'd find a girl to make a fake phone call and then watch as our friend would go to the 'date'.

Humour is big here. It's our way, Bosnian way.

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
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
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
