Letter From Sarah Cottrill

"It's the most wonderful time of the year!"

Apart from a love of Gill, I don't have very much in common with my daughter's boyfriend! It's not that we don't get on – we do – it's just he likes football, I'd rather watch paint dry; he understands technology, I don't; I like vegetables, classical music and poetry, he doesn't; You get the picture! On one thing, however, we are united – we both get excited about Christmas. It's a wonderful time of year! A time for peace and goodwill; for the giving and receiving of presents; for being with the people we love whilst remembering and celebrating the love of God for us and His gift of Jesus. That's what Christmas should be all about. But is the reality rather different? Has Christmas become so commercialised that instead of being a holy season of joy and love it has become a time of stress and anxiety; of spending money we don't have on people we never think about the rest of the year; of eating and drinking too much in the company of other stressed out and quarrelsome people? Do we spend the Christmas season frantically rushing from one social gathering to the next possibly just managing to squeeze in a carol service because the children like it? Where, in the midst of all our activity, is Christ?

Please don't misunderstand me; I enjoy the secular side of Christmas as much as anybody. I'll be there on Christmas Day with my silly hat, playing daft games, eating and drinking far more than I need, and I actually don't think this in itself is necessarily wrong. It's all a question of balance. Christ came to give us life in abundance and that includes enjoying ourselves and "letting our hair down" sometimes. We read many times, in the Gospels, of Christ attending parties, or feasts. In fact, much of His teaching took place over a meal or on the way to and from a (continued overleaf)

It is important to remember though, that on these journeys to and from meals and parties, Christ also tended the needs of the destitute, the sick and the outcast. He was never in too much of a rush, never too stressed, to listen to the needs of others and to demonstrate His love for them. In the midst of our celebrations, we too, can take care of others. When we're buying our festive food, we can buy some extra tins to give to the food bank, MAGGS or to St Paul's; when we're planning our party outfit, we can look out last year's Christmas jumper and donate it to a charity; when we're inviting friends round for a drink or a meal, we can include Mrs Smith down the road who has no family; and when we're rushing past an open church building we can take a moment to go in and offer a prayer of thanks for God's many gifts to us and to hold before Him the needs of others.

When I was a student, many years ago, I saw a sketch which made a lasting impact on me. It began with dim lights, a "religious" carol playing softly and a cross standing centre stage. Two people stood holding a banner which read: "Christmas sacred."

Suddenly all the lights came on, blaring pop music replaced the carol and the stage was filled with "party-goers" drinking, dancing and generally revelling. The cross gradually got nudged to the back where it was used to hang coats and the banner got ripped. Then the lights dimmed again, the party revellers froze and the banner came forward. It had been patched together but now instead of "Christmas sacred" its message read "Christ massacred."

This Christmas I hope you will enjoy time with family and friends. I hope you will spend time relaxing and perhaps doing silly things. I hope you will indulge yourselves and your loved ones. But I pray that you will balance this with active love and care for the less fortunate amongst us and above all, that you will keep Christmas as a Sacred time in your homes and in your hearts.

St John-in-Bedwardine Church is an active Anglican church which has its roots in the Norman period. The church is open daily, as a haven of peace at a busy road junction in the St. Johns area of Worcester.

The church was originally built in 1165 as 'The Chapel of St John' – the parish church then being St. Cuthbert's in Lower Wick. When the church of St Cuthbert's was demolished in 1370, St John's became the parish church.

My Mum is part of the chaplaincy volunteers team at Worcester Royal Hospital where one of the services they provide is a supply of knitted Prayer Squares. These small squares, featuring a cross in the middle, are blessed and left in a basket in the prayer room for anybody to take. They have proved to be immensely popular with patients in the hospital and the volunteers and chaplains have received countless messages of thanks and appreciation for the comfort they bring. However, the volunteers are struggling to keep up with demand and so I am asking for anybody who can knit to make some of these squares for the hospital. They are really easy to do. Even I, a novice knitter, can produce one in less than an hour!

The pattern is below and if you are able to make some, please bring them into church and give them to either me or to Mum. Thank you.

Prayer Square.

Double knit wool. 4mm needles.

Cast on 19 stitches. Rows 1 - 6: knit. Row 7: K3 P13 K3. Row 8: (And all even rows). Knit. Row 9: K3 P5 K3 P5 K3. Row 11: K3 P5 K3 P5 K3. Row 13: K3 P5 K3 P5 K3 Row 15: K3 P5 K3 P5 K3. Row 17: K3 P5 K3 P5 K3. Row 19: K3 P2 K9 P2 K3. Row 21: K3 P2 K9 P2 K3. Row 23: K3 P2 K9 P2 K3. Row 25: K3 P5 K3 P5 K3 Row 27: K3 P5 K3 P5 K3. Row 29: K3 P13 K3. Rows 30 – 35: Knit. Cast off.

PCC Meeting 15th & 26th September 2015

The meeting (adjourned on 15th September) resumed on 26th September, following a discussion among all Group PCCs about service patterns. The PCC ratified the following pattern for Sunday services, with effect from the start of 2016:

- 8am: No change.
- 10.30am: Non-Eucharistic service on the second Sunday of each month (Led by ALMs with the Music Group, approximately 45 minutes long, and titled "Family Service"). No change on other Sundays.
- 5pm: No change.

There will also be one ALM-led non-Eucharistic principal service per month at St Michael's and St Clement's and there will be a joint service when there is a fifth Sunday in the month (replacing joint services for Patronal Festivals). The clergy will support the ALM team by preparing a liturgy for the year and a theme for each month.

The meeting closed.

Volunteering: In Cambodia!

I work for BT and we have a company intranet that we have to use to access timesheets, expenses and training. One day, back in February, I was on the intranet and happened to notice a tiny message at the bottom that said something like "Volunteers needed for Cambodia". It piqued my interest and I followed the link. It talked about a project that had been running for a few years where BT People and their friends and family went to Cambodia to help build houses for some of the country's poorest people. It sounded so exciting and worthwhile and I wished I could do it but immediately dismissed it as out of the question and carried on. But as time went by, it kept popping into my head and increasingly I thought – "what's really stopping me?" And so it was that at the end of October I found myself on the longest journey of my life, to go further East than I had ever been, to a culture and climate I had read about but never experienced to meet up with 45 other people I had only ever exchanged a few emails with and to go and build houses.

It was a long journey -I went from Worcester to London to Doha to Saigon to Phnom Penh and it took the best part of 24 hours but then I was there and there was no doubt I was in another part of the world.



On the first day we went for an induction at the charity that organises the housebuilding and then went for a very challenging visit first to the Tuol Sleng Genocide Museum – a preserved prison/torture camp used by the Khmer Rouge to force people into confessions and then to the Killing Field associated with that prison where those who were tortured into confessing were taken and executed. The number

killed and the brutality was almost impossible to take in even though we were surrounded by the evidence of it in front of our very eyes and all such a short time ago. It helped us understand why the country was in the state it was and why the people who we would meet would find it so hard to believe that a bunch of foreigners would just come to their village and do something nice.

The next day we were up at 6:30 for a two hour drive out to the first village. The drive was amazing as we drove through markets spilling onto the road, wedding tents and

beautiful Buddhist temples. At the village we were given our briefing (and hammers), split into teams and sent off to our first house. Local contractors had already built the framework on stilts, needed because the area floods, so our job was to nail the corrugated iron walls on and finish off the floor. There were six of us on the team but only two of us who would go up a ladder...and one of those was me! So it was hot work in the 32 degree heat up a ladder banging in nails but with regular water breaks and a visit to a guy who crushed sugar palm canes on a machine on the back of his moped to make juice, we stayed hydrated and before we knew it we were saying goodbye to the first family as they stood proudly on the steps of their new home and it was on to the next.

By the end of the day between us we had completed 20 houses and it was time for a handing over ceremony. We gave the families who would live in the new houses



a blanket which would be laid on the floor of the new house – this is symbolic and as they accept the gift of the blanket they are also accepting the gift of the house.

(That's me on the left of this picture).

We were close to the equator so it gets dark quite early, but it was off to a restaurant when we got back where the staff are all street children who are being trained to be waiters and chefs and then off to bed ready for another 6:30 start!

The next day's village was much more rural with views out over paddy fields that were just beautiful. There were only 16 houses to build in this village but somehow everything seemed that much harder, but we got them done and again it was handover time and we were done.

It was an amazing experience and opened my eyes in the way I had hoped it would to what poverty really means, but also what a difference the right kind of help can make. Thanks to all those who sponsored me - the 36 houses we built $\cot 25\%$ for the materials, local contractors, well drilling etc. and while I won't be going back out I will be helping to raise funds so that next year's team can make a similar difference.

The future of Churches Together

As usual, Churches Together in West Worcester met in October for its Annual General Meeting, and most of the west side churches were represented. These meetings are a chance to share news, and to plan ways in which our churches can work more closely together to further the cause of the gospel in west Worcester.

The AGM was a particular opportunity to reflect on the state of Churches Together in west Worcester: how far have we come, and where are we heading? A lengthy discussion ensued.

It's important that you are aware of the outcomes of that reflection.

Overall, there was a real feeling that Churches Together has lost momentum in the last few years. To be fair, people are all very busy and when so much else crowds in on our time it's perhaps inevitable that ecumenism slips down our priority list. But for all that, there was nonetheless a sense that Churches Together has begun to suffer through a lack of a really clear vision for the future.

Chatting to folks at the AGM, the feeling was that many in the congregations don't have a clear sense of what Churches Together is for, and what it might achieve. We all agreed that we still do some good things together – for example, the March of Witness on Good Friday, the shared carol service at Christmas, and the Churches Together away day – but the overall feeling we're in danger of losing a clear sense of purpose and direction.

The clergy are committed to the cause of working together to further the gospel in west Worcester - but to develop a clearer vision for that work, we have to listen carefully to where the Spirit is leading us. Does the Spirit even want Churches Together to continue? If so, in what format? The answer lies with all of us as Christians, not just the clergy: God speaks to every Christian by his Spirit, and we need to reflect together on what the Spirit is saying to us as followers of Christ.

To help us do that, we've decided to do something slightly different for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in January.

Normally, the Week of Prayer would culminate in an ecumenical service on the Sunday evening. However, this has struggled to get support in recent years. Consequently, we've decided to drop this service and instead have a short (20-30 minute) service at 12.30pm on Saturday 23rd January, followed by a bring and share lunch. The idea is to encourage folks from all the churches to come together and socialise as we eat; over the lunch, we're going to invite you to reflect with those at your table on one question: 'what is the Spirit saying to you about the future of Churches Together in west Worcester?' We'll ask you to write down your thoughts, and then the clergy will get together to read through the responses, to pray, and to

reflect. Hopefully this will give us a sense of whether or not Churches Together has a future here in west Worcester, and, if so, a clearer vision for the format it might take.

We hope you'll put this date in your diary now, and - if you at all can - come along and join us. In the meantime, please do pray about the cause of Churches Together, and reflect in your own heart about its future.

As the year draws to a close, the music examining season gets busier and, once again, I have been on my travels. This time I have been to Malaysia. I was only there for a week but it was a wonderful week packed with music and lovely people. One of the students finished her exam and enthusiastically wished me a very happy Christmas as she went out. In a predominantly Muslim country this was perhaps a little surprising but Christmas trees and lights were appearing during the week I was there and it made me realise once again how universal the festival of Christmas has become.

If Christmas and the extended build up to it have become just one big opportunity to party how can we keep the true message of the birth of Jesus at the front of our hearts and minds? For me of course music has a huge role to play in that and, as I look forward to singing all the familiar carols once again, I think of the words they contain and how profound they are if we just take the time to listen and reflect on them.

O little town of Bethlehem may perhaps seem to be one of the more sentimental carols we sing yet contains the very kernel of the Christmas message for me. At the end of the first verse comes the line: 'The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight'. From The Magazine Archive, December 1950

Two extracts from the letter from the Vicar (John Mort):

All the year round the world unconsciously pays its homage to the fact of Christ and His lowly cradle; for there is not a newspaper, or a cheque, or a letter that does not bear a date upon it. The world reckons its time from the first Christmas Day. Not only our reading and writing, but even our trade carries that hidden Name upon its documents and records. But who when he writes 1950 or 1951 ever thinks what these figures mean?

It is strange, when you think of it, that the angel-choir should have chosen shepherds for their audience. One might have expected that the good news of a Saviour's birth would be proclaimed first to a priest at the Altar or to some select company of holy men who waited eargerly for His coming. Instead of that, the message came to ordinary men, representatives of the world's workers, the reason being that God's Christmas Gift was meant for the whole world—not merely for the devout and expectant, but for its humble, toiling millions.

And not only was the Gospel preached first to the common people, but it was preached to men at their work. We are all inclined to regard the day's work and religion as things apart. Yet here at the very beginning, the message of the Gospel enters the sphere of daily duty and claims a hearing there—a symbol surely of the fact that it comes to redeem the world's work and turn its toil to worship.
