Letter from Bishop John

In this diocese we are committed to fulfilling our vocation to become Kingdom people characterised by love, compassion, justice and freedom. An enormous amount of consultation was undertaken before our Kingdom vision was adopted and I am gratified by the manner in which it is reaching deep into the diocesan bloodstream.



In order to help to realise that vision, Diocesan Synod adopted a Calling Young Disciples project as a major focus within it. The project will complement and add to the work of our Youth Officer, Simon Hill and Children's Officer, Emma Pettifer,

most parishes wanted work with children and young people to be a priority. helping more churches to engage effectively with children, young people and their families. During the consultation, it was clear that most parishes wanted work with children and young people to be a priority.

I am delighted that Ruth Walker, a very able and experienced priest from the Diocese of Coventry, has just been appointed as Project Director. Ruth will be licensed at Diocesan Synod in November and will formally start her

new role thereafter. We have received a generous grant from the Mercers' Company, for which we are very grateful, to fund this post. We have also applied for funding from the Church Commissioners to appoint mission enablers to work on the project in parishes and we shall be working with Ruth on the appointment of the first two of these in the next few months. OUR CHURCH

St John-in-Bedwardine Church is an active Anglican church which has its roots in the Norman period. The church is open daily, as a haven of peace at a busy road junction in the St. Johns area of Worcester. The church was originally built in 1165 as 'The Chapel of St John' – the parish church then being St. Cuthbert's in Lower Wick. When the church of St Cuthbert's was demolished in 1370, St John's became the parish church.

Dear Friends

After all the changes mentioned last time, one might have thought this time there would be a slightly calmer tone. Not so. The changes have continued, and one reason for delaying this letter was waiting until things were official, which technically only happened this week.

So, the latest news: In June Juan Carlos met with the Bishop and said that since there were three Churches in San Juan de Miraflores which either have no pastor or whose pastors are over 70, he would be prepared to move from



the Cathedral to one of those. Bp Jorge told him this was an answer to prayer (since no one had expected Juan Carlos to make such an offer, it was also a rather unexpected answer to prayer). Over the years we have come to know people in these churches so none was going to represent a completely new start. As a result, Juan Carlos had his final Sunday at the Good Shepherd last week, and will now be working in Jesús el Nazareno

Church, which has been without their own pastor for several months; his installation will be on 18th Sept. Jesús el Nazareno is where we held the Marriage Course last year, where the embroidered pictures project is based, and where Juan Carlos has been involved with several Alpha retreats.

Meanwhile, Penny will be staying at the Cathedral until the new Rector there is installed (certainly NOT 18th Sept!), when she will join Juan Carlos. This will be some time next year... Building the profile, now available on the Cathedral website, was definitely a congregational process; a fair proportion of the congregation made suggestions and comments. The result was acceptable to everyone, no mean feat when considering the huge range

of background from which people come, culturally and theologically; we currently have people from Baptist, Roman Catholic, Pentecostal, Nazarene and Presbyterian backgrounds, amongst others (even some who are from Anglican churches anyway!). It is definitely not a homogeneous



group, which leads to interesting discussions at times, as in Adult Forum. We had visiting clergy from overseas for most of the period June to August, but from now on Carlo and Penny (the two lay ministers with pastoral oversight of the congregation) will have responsibility for the services (Luis has left); fortunately we have a visiting preacher for the Remembrance Day service which is attended amongst others by Ambassadors or Embassy representatives from several countries (along with their security guards, in some instances; these do not usually speak English and spend the service talking just outside the main door).

Both Juan Carlos and Penny are therefore currently each in charge of different congregations. A challenge on time-management since over the last 6½ years when we did not have these responsibilities we have both accepted other responsibilities, taken on when there was more time:

Alpha:

We both went to a conference which JC organized in Cuzco in June, which was well attended although we are still waiting to hear someone has started a course... Juan Carlos also travelled in August to Juliaca to help with the Youth Weekend there, and took advantage of the visit to talk about Alpha in prisons. However, the most encouraging news is that a big independent Church in Lima is going to start the Marriage Course, and has also bought 200 copies of the ordinary Alpha manual.....

OCESIS DEL PE

AMA

Since the beginning of the year Penny has been a member of the AMA committee again and we are in the final stages of preparing a Diocesan retreat (to be held 7-9 Oct). The theme is "Prayer warriors", with the aim of building up the prayer life of women in the Diocese.

Perú Tres Días

We are both still very involved with the ecumenical cursillo "Perú Tres Días" here, and have our respective weekends this month. Each of us is leading Spiritual Director; there is also a pastor from outside Lima helping us.

Hello from Heidi

By the time you have read this, chances are we will have already met. However, I thought I'd use this space to tell you a little about myself and about why I'm here. My name is Heidi and I'm the new Youth and Outreach Worker for West Worcester Churches.

I am from Malvern, but before that lived in Glasgow for a few years where I studied for an as-yet-uncompleted MA in English Language and Scottish Literature. When I'm not at work, I love reading and the arts. I try to get to the theatre as much as I can/can afford; and I'm a



huge fan of spoken word and performance poetry. I've been a foodie for as long as I can remember, and I love good coffee and good wine – but I rarely buy either!

passionate about the power of communities

I'm incredibly passionate about the power of communities to change the world. I work through a community centred model, meaning that all future growth comes from within a community and my role is a support pillar to facilitate growth and strength.

Community is also at the centre of everything that the church does, a cornerstone not just of the Christian faith, but all the major faiths. That means we need to be looking at how we are working for the people of West Worcester. That's where I come in. My job is not about getting seats on pews, it's about bringing people together to make those tiny changes to build something that lasts.

My best example of how the Christian faith fits into communities and everyday lives is Chance The Rapper's album, 'Colouring Book'; a gospel hip-hop album that discusses faith in an honest and open way, has sold millions of copies around the world, and been nominated for a number of awards. It shows how in music firmly rooted in hiphop, by an artist popular within the genre, can explore faith and Christianity accessibly. It's also a very good album; I have a copy if anyone wants to borrow it.

In the short time I have been in post, I have had conversations about showcasing children's faith, about recognising achievement and about child loss within the same hour; I have tried to alleviate fear about how communities change; and I have spent 30 minutes of my life painting dinosaurs with a toddler. Over the next twelve months, and hopefully longer, my work will look at what we can do in all of these scenarios, and what the church needs to do to move forward as a whole community.

The choir and organ certainly played their part with singing at a wedding on the Saturday thrown in for good measure! The concert though was on the Sunday and it proved to be a super way to end a busy but enjoyable weekend.

We were treated to an afternoon of varied musical delights in 'A Sunday Serenade'. Shulah Oliver is a very talented local professional violin and viola player and she has, over the last few years raised over £50,000 for a cause that is dear to her heart, namely Guide Dogs for the Blind. Many of you will know that Ruth Reeves is currently looking after Jinney, a beautiful golden Labrador puppy, who will, after her initial training with Ruth, hopefully go on to be a fully fledged Guide Dog. So, when Ruth approached me with the idea of putting together a concert featuring Shulah and our own organist, John Brierley, to raise funds for the charity, I was delighted to pitch in and help. I approached four of my singing students to come along and provide some songs and Tim Cox from our congregation was also persuaded to take part. The resulting programme was a great mixture of playing and singing with solos and ensembles.

Shulah's choice of music was lovely with well-known composers such as Elgar, Shostakovich and Gershwin mingling with less familiar but equally effective music



In between, my singers had some fun with songs such as 'The Owl and the Pussy Cat' and 'Wouldn't it be loverly'. Audience participation was even encouraged (or, as it said on the programme: 'Expected. By Order!') as Tim sang 'The Policeman's Song' from Gilbert and Sullivan's The Pirates of Penzance.

Baking through history

One of the key features of our Sunday Evensong services is the after service cake and tea. The cake, like the music, is provided by members of the choir and it provides the opportunity for fellowship and chat. The words and the music we sing are part of a long tradition and some of it goes back a long way. For example, when we sing plainchant we are linking ourselves with our medieval ancestors who may well have sung the same music in St John's.

So what were our ancestors eating? We also know that in the Middle Ages, the church was the centre of the local life and functioned in many ways as a community centre. So you can be sure there was cake involved.

For the heritage open days, the events team baked a cake from every century from the 14th onwards and asked visitors to place them in chronological order.

No-one got them all correct and most guesses were pretty wide of the mark. Surprisingly, very few actually placed the Victoria Sponge in the 19th century and not many were familiar with the recipe for Anzac biscuits, introduced by New Zealand and Australian troops at Gallipoli. It would seem that teaching History and compulsively baking to relieve the stress of teaching caused me to overestimate people's historical/ culinary knowledge. But everyone seemed to find it interesting and fun to have a go, and it was certainly lots of fun to research and prepare.

I thought it would be a good idea to include some of the recipes in the magazine, so here are the two earliest ones, representing the 14th and 15th respectively. As you can see, they are very similar in technique and neither actually involves any baking. The 15th century recipe certainly caught out those who attempted to do the quiz without tasting. It most definitely was not a chocolate brownie!

Summary of the minutes of the PCC meeting held on 23rd August 2016

The meeting was opened with a prayer with the Vicar in the chair.16 members were present.

The **strategic item** for this meeting was the review of the 2016 priorities. Normally this would be paired with setting the 2017 priorities, but this time the new priorities will be informed by results of the Kingdom People questionnaire (and possibly a Parish Retreat in November).

For 2016 we had two priorities – the vicar asked the PCC to discuss each priority in small groups and give feedback on each one:

Outreach and serving the community:

- What do we mean by "Outreach" and "Community"?
- We need to look back at what the "Outreach Committee" investigated and concluded.
- We must not try and do too much.
- Various positive comments about the activities and events that we do run.
- Could do more in terms of digital presence.
- Overall conclusion doing pretty well.

Children and Families; Schools; Christian Nurture:

• Overall conclusion – doing pretty well on Children and Families and Christian Nurture, but schools are a tough nut to crack.

Under **West Worcester Churches**, the Vicar said there was nothing to report from the diocese on transition to a Team. There was a brief update about each of the other churches. The Vicar has introduced at St John's a midweek BCP Communion service (10am Tuesdays). This is going well with congregation in the low teens (although some of this may be displaced from the Sunday 8am service). He is considering introducing a Common Worship Communion on another day.

Under **Outreach and serving the community**, there was an update on the Youth and Family Worker: An appointment ('Heidi') has been made, to commence on 5th September [Editor - see page 25]. The Vicar will ask her to consider taking on Little Lambs. The key part of the role is to look at where the needs are, and further sources of funding. St Michael's has a grant application out for a Children's Worker. The charity committee reported the grants it had made so far. The Vicar described the initiative to understand the church's various charitable pots and combine them under 'Poor' and 'Fabric'.

Safeguarding: Arising out of the review of our working on safeguarding, Jane Askew reported that she has a list of the actions required.

The accommodation committee submitted its customary report on work done and in progress. Following the fall of stonework from the tower onto the roof, the urgent repairs have been done. The church architect advises no immediate further action – the matter can be picked up in the next quinquennial inspection.

In the Blakefield Room, it was agreed to push on with replacement curtains; to clean and re-seal the floor; to continue investigations and discussions about new chairs; to proceed with a screen and projector.

The light bulbs in church are being progressively replaced with LED units. These save money on energy consumption and remove the risks from heating of the wiring.

The faculty has been received for the double glazing in the office etc.

Before we can move forward on re-ordering we need to be clear what we want the space for (e.g. better welcome, more space for breakfasts).

Under 'Children and Families; Schools; Christian Nurture Children and Families' the Vicar reported that there will be a further Pilgrim course in the autumn. The Vicar said he was thinking about another discussion group of some sort and floated some ideas for discussion.

The Standing Committee report was accepted. The committee discussed the overall coordination of Health and Safety for events and other church matters and agreed that we should have a co-ordinator liaising with someone in each of the main groups (clergy, events and buildings). On a trial basis Brian Askew will take this on.

2016 finances are generally in line with the budgets, apart from some timing issues. However, fund raising is lower than hoped and well behind the figure at the same time last year. The Treasurer advised against a repeat of last year's Christmas fete having half of the proceeds passed on. We could certainly advertise a donation, but the decision needs to be made by the PCC or Standing Committee in view of our likely outcome later in the year.

It was agreed to purchase new banners to promote the breakfasts.

The PCC supported the re-authorisation of Sylvia Render as ALM (Pastoral Assistant and Worship leader).

The meeting closed with all saying 'The Grace'.

St FRANCIS

4th October is the feast day of St Francis of Assisi. When Francis came to God people thought he had gone mad and even his own father disowned him. But Francis' simple way of life soon attracted others. He and his companions went out to preach two by two. Unlike the preachers and priests that people were used to, they wore sackcloth and barefoot. They went were different in other ways too; they lived a very simple life and celebrated God's creation.

And to Francis all of God's creation was equally important. In one famous story a wolf had been eating people. The town wanted to kill the wolf but Francis talked the wolf into never killing again. And the townspeople made sure that the wolf always had plenty to eat.

Even blindness did not discourage Francis' spirit when he wrote his beautiful 'Canticle of the Sun' praising God through the miracle of His creation. Francis died aged only 45, worn out with years of poverty and wandering.

SWIM, FISH, SWIM

How do you make a paper fish swim? Cut a fish shape from a sheet of ordinary writing paper. Make it 10-12cm long, and decorate it making sure that the colours won't run when the fish gets wet. In the centre of the fish's body cut a small circle and then a very narrow slit from the tail to the circle.

Proposal to amend the objectives of charity 257634

The local St Johns charity "Church Lands" is an ancient charitable trust dating back to at least 1640. The original form of the trusts was to hold land and properties and put the rents and profits to charitable uses. The trustees were described as "Feoffees". Over the years, all the properties have been sold by previous trustees (usually when large repair bills were looming) and thus the charity assets now consist solely of endowments with grants made out of income.

The funds held by the Feoffees have a long and complicated history. There were numerous predecessor funds from multiple sources and with various purposes (see page 51). At the end of the nineteenth century, charitable and educational funds were differentiated by legislation and the funds were split. The requirement for that ended when universal state education provision came in. Over the years there have been mergers and combinations of the various trusts, and the purposes of the charity have become unclear and out-of-date.

The majority of the current funds are designated for the repair and maintenance of the St John's church building and this is clear. However, a small percentage of the funds are seen to be usable for purposes related to education and poverty, but the purposes in this area are very unclear and this inhibits the making of grants.

The present trustees wish to update and clarify the purposes of the charity to give clarity to the operation of the charity and its making of grants related to education and poverty. To do this, the trustees will need to request the Charity Commission to make a 'scheme'. Before this can happen, the Charity Commission requires the trustees to consult anyone who will be affected by or have an interest in the changes. The trustees have therefore resolved to consult community stakeholders including the St John's congregation via the Parish Magazine.

The charity is registered with the Charity Commission with number 257634.

<u>Proposal</u>

The revised objectives will be based upon the spirit and intentions of the oldest document available (an indenture of 1640) saying the income shall be used for *"the use, benefit and behoof of the said parish and for the reparation of the said church and to such other godly and charitable purposes as [to the trustees] should be thought fit and convenient."*.

The actual proposed wording for the revised objectives is based upon the above, while using wording from Charity Commission literature to reflect current legislation:

The objectives of the charity are, for public benefit:

- (a) To maintain and improve the church and church properties of St John-in-Bedwardine, Worcester. This objective includes payment for the works and associated professional advice.
- (b) To advance such charitable purposes (according to the law of England and Wales) as the trustees see fit from time to time in sympathy with the perceived wishes of the original donors, in particular, but not limited to, the prevention or relief of poverty, the advancement of education, the advancement of religion and the relief of those in need, by reason of youth, age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage.

Governing Document

The revised objectives will be included in a revised Governing Document. Please contact the church office if you would like a full copy of this.

Present purposes

The Charity is presently governed by an Order of the Charity Commissioners dated 22nd January 1886 as amended by a scheme of 5th November 1969 (which removed the requirement for the Charity Commission to approve the appointments of non-official Trustees). Neither of these documents clearly states the objectives.

The 1640 indenture is on file with the Charity Commission, although it is not explicitly referenced in the documents of 1886 or 1969.
