### From Sarah Cottrill

In 2011 the UK Christian charity, Stewardship, launched its "Forty Acts of Kindness" challenge. On each day of Lent, participants were encouraged to perform an act of kindness, sometimes for family or friends, sometimes for complete strangers, or for the community as a whole. Challenges ranged from litter picking to paying the grocery bill of the person in front of you at the supermarket.



More ongoing challenges included becoming a blood donor or volunteering for a charity. In my view, anything that encourages kindness and generosity is good, but were these acts of kindness really random? Participants didn't really have to think about them – the ideas were provided each day; but neither were they spontaneous – they were pre-meditated, if not by the individual then by somebody working at the charity office. The choice of recipient may have been random; the action itself was less so.

Nonetheless, random acts of kindness are being performed on a daily basis, as Mum and I recently experienced for ourselves. On the Wednesday before Christmas I took Mum to Malvern Theatre to see "A Christmas Carol." We were advised by the theatre that Grange Road was closed and we would need to access the theatre via the park, having used the car park behind the park. For those of you not familiar with Priory Park, the walk is pleasant enough but involves a long slope up to the theatre. Mum was adamant that we didn't need to follow the diversion signs to find somewhere closer to the theatre; she could and would walk through the park. It very soon became clear that the slope, gentle enough for the able -bodied was a challenge on the scale of Mount Everest for Mum! After having to stop several times to recover her breath, she was almost ready to admit defeat when a kindly woman came along and after one look at Mum raced off to the theatre, returning in a few moments, with a wheelchair. She pushed Mum the rest of the way and saw us safely installed in the foyer.

The walk had taken us a long time and we were both cold. Whereas I quickly warmed up again, Mum didn't and having found our seats, I took my coat off, pushed Mum's hands up its sleeves and sat rubbing her hands to warm them. The man in the next seat saw this and, assuring Mum that his hands were always warm, took her hands in his and for the next ten minutes Mum sat contentedly holding hands with a complete stranger until she felt warm again.

Two random acts of kindness which meant such a lot to two people in a difficult situation. Mum and I don't know the names of our helpers; we will probably never see them again – or recognise them if we do – but their simple acts of compassion and kindness will stay with us.

Throughout his earthly ministry, Jesus seized many opportunities to perform random acts of kindness; unplanned encounters which led to healing miracles and the proclamation of God's love through words and deeds. Of all the parables Jesus told, my favourite is that of the sheep and the goats (Matthew 25, 31 - 46). The response of the righteous to Jesus's comment about them feeding, sheltering, clothing and visiting him, shows that their deeds of kindness were indeed random. They did not record them in any "tally." They did not congratulate themselves on their own goodness or piety. They simply recognized a need, met it where and when they could and moved on. They served God unconsciously through their compassion towards others.

This is a wonderful model for us to use in our own lives and behaviour. Acts of kindness should not be done in a blaze of publicity, courting attention and praise. Rather they should be done quietly, unobtrusively. They should be performed for those we don't know and for those we know have no means of returning the favour. Returning to the experience of me and Mum, that lady probably had no thought that she was pushing Christ in a wheelchair. I doubt that the man in the next seat considered for a moment that he was holding Christ's cold hand between his own warm ones. Yet Christ honours all such actions as being done for him.

February 17th is Random Acts of Kindness Day with 14th – 20th being designated Random Acts of Kindness Week. You can go online and find a wealth of suggestions for things to do during that week. Like the Forty Acts of Kindness Challenge, this is a well-intentioned initiative and one we could all embrace. But why wait for a particular day or week? Our Lord commanded us to love one another as he loves us. That should manifest itself by always showing love and kindness, every day, every week, for the whole of our lives.

If this is something you think would interest you, please let me know and I will liaise between volunteers and Helen to find something that suits everybody.



## They have a hymn list!

When I last wrote for the magazine, I was slightly giddy that I had completed my first assignment. I can now reveal that I passed! It's just one step out of many and I'm already getting anxious about the next one, but Historical Criticism of the Hebrew Bible is in the bag at least and I've learned more about Isaiah than I thought possible in the process.

As I write at the start of January, term hasn't started yet although seminars on the New Testament are about to begin and then I have a residential where we are looking at the dynamics of church congregations. That seems to be fascinating - a mix of anthropology and sociology. I've read articles about "Bowen Family Systems Theory" and watched videos of systems models of congregations and how to spot if you are in a cult (spoiler alert - we are not!) My mind is slightly blown by the social science, which is all new to me, but I'm sure when we all get together with our tutor all will become clear. Watch this space as I think I will be doing some practical applications of what we learn and you guys may be my research subjects!

One thing that we will definitely be doing at the residential is re-forming the "readers choir". I've just been sent the hymn list so I'm looking forward to some rehearsals under the keen ear of our choir master.



The new testament reading I have been doing is great. We are reminded that we are doing biblical study, not bible study. It's a more dispassionate, critical approach that considers the historical context that the gospels and epistles were written in. As someone who never got to do much *Continued on page 17*

Continued from page 15 history I'm drinking it all in. For instance, I learned that Vesuvius erupted right in the middle of the period that the New Testament was written. On one level I must have known that, but I'd just never made the connection between what I'd learned as history and what I'd learned as scripture.

And then there is the information about the world that Jesus himself would have grown up and lived in - much of which comes from Jewish scholars who use the New Testament as a great source of historical information. The Roman Empire is constantly in mind affecting all the characters that we encounter, but they weren't all bad and emperor Constantine is particularly important to the development of the New Testament. So far I've just skimmed some of the highlights in preparation for the first seminar, but I'm looking forward to getting stuck into the detail and in particular learning more about Paul.



The children made their Christingles during the service as the elements of it were explained to them. Phil Bradford gave an explanation of the meaning of each element.




Then Rob Little and Beth Broadway helped demonstrate to the congregation how to build the Christingles.

# February 2nd, Candlemas



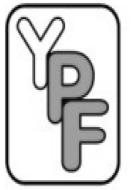



## "Random acts of kindness" - a reflection.

This phrase sums up an aspect of the February "Make kindness the Norm" campaign which sits happily with the spirit of the commandments at the heart of our Christian faith.

Every Tuesday morning at Saint John's we have a Eucharist using the Book of Common Prayer (often referred to just as BCP) and I often wonder how often folk read the prayers and other texts that are not used during the ceremony. They are worth our observation and reflection.

After the sentence "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven" there is a double page of scriptural quotations, many of which are quite apposite for this campaign.

"Whatsoever ye would that men do unto you, even so do unto them; for this is the Law and the Prophets."

"He that soweth little shall reap little; he that soweth plenteously shall reap plenteously."

"Give alms of thy goods, and never turn thy face from any poor man."

It is also heartening to hear courteous gestures offered to people during daily interaction and to see people giving way on the footpath or opening the shop door for someone who has limited mobility.

Following my frequent visits to France, I have often remarked to folk here that over there they are most ready to wish you "Good Morning" or "Enjoy your meal" when you are just sitting down to a meal in a restaurant. In shops you are likely to receive as a reply to your simple "Thank you" the retort "It is we who thank you!" making your experience as a customer so much more pleasant.

Small things that bring pleasure and have no cost.

So, this February is the time for a late New Year resolution. Spread a little happiness as you go on your way.

This extremely overdue letter WAS being written with updates on such happy memories as

- A wonderful family break in the UK mid Aug to mid Sept (see photo on front page!)



The effort being made by some (sadly not all!) of the Abundant Life group, who finished the sessions at the beginning of Dec. Half the group are barely literate, so a written exam is totally out of the question (and not, after all, the point of the course). Unfortunately general busy-ness means that the theory of spending time with

each of these people doing an oral exam has not yet happened.....

- The small music group in Jesús el Nazareno. Whilst several of those who enthusiastically started attending the practices have now dropped out, there is a still a core of 3 who show commitment
- The formation of a choir in the Good Shepherd to sing at the Carol Service. Apart from the pretty good musical level, at least 2 of those taking part for the first time commented on how lovely it was to learn to serve God in a new way



HOWEVER, as most of you (if not all!) are aware, Peru has suddenly become an item of world news. On 7 Dec, the day Congress was going to discuss the President's impeachment for the 3<sup>rd</sup> time since he took office in July 2021, I was sitting on a bus on the way to the Cathedral to set up and generally get things ready for the evening Carol Service when one of the people due to read sent a message – "Are we still having the Carol Service?" A somewhat confusing question since I was totally unaware of anything that would mean NO. I was enlightened a few minutes later by a call from Juan Carlos who put me in the picture.....There followed a few bizarre hours which included

- Chaos as people tried to get home (in the totally understandable fear that troops on the streets could well lead to some very nasty things)
- The vote by Congress (who had refused to accept the President's decision to close Congress, on the (defendable) grounds that this was an unconstitutional move) to impeach him
- The arrest of the previous President by his own police escort, thus avoiding him reaching the Mexican Embassy and asylum; this news was greeted (in Lima) by the equivalent of cheers on car horns (all those people in traffic jams....) (He is currently in preventive detention in a prison which formerly held just one prisoner – ex-President

Fujimori; so it is still a prison exclusively for ex-Presidents but now has 2 residents)

 The swearing-in of the new President Dina Boluarte (previously vice-President)

So by 4pm on 7 Dec things seemed fairly calm. And indeed life DID continue. We had the postponed Carol Service on 11<sup>th</sup> Dec, and schools etc worked normally on



Monday and Tuesday. However, trouble was brewing. Discontent was not only against the previous President. 83% of people want new GENERAL elections, involving both President and Congress, but it was clear that most Congress members are not thinking of moving on until they have to (July 2026). So, in some areas of Peru (mostly those already known for disturbances and for violent uprisings), the unrest began, leading to the declaration of a state of emergency for 30 days with a curfew in most of the country (though not Lima). In Lima there is still mostly calm, but parts of Peru, especially in the South (eg Arequipa) are cut off, with damage to government buildings, power lines and other things. "Collateral damage" from the blocking of main roads and closure of provincial airports means that the Christmas Box boxes, prepared and ready to go to the Arequipa and Cusco areas, are now stuck in the Cathedral until ???, and Idú from Jesús el Nazareno who went to spend her birthday with her mother is now stuck there, again until ????

Thank you to those who are already praying. Please continue to pray (see next page)

Meanwhile, we are preparing for Christmas. Both Becky and Lizi will be arriving Dec 23, Lizi for 3 weeks (during which time she will work from here, getting up at 4 am to do so), whilst Becky is returning to Peru to settle here. She has learnt a lot from her time in the UK but has decided she feels far more Peruvian than British.

And then in 2023 there is a big change ahead. Juan Carlos will be based in Arequipa whilst Penny continues in Lima, BUT one week in 4 JC will be in Lima and another week Penny in Arequipa. So we will see each other 2 weeks out of 4, but do a lot of travelling..... Quite how this will work has yet to be seen; JC will spend from mid Jan to mid April sounding things out, and then after our time visiting UK (yes, we hope to see lots of you!) will be able to settle into whatever is in store..... Please pray for this new move!
