#### From Nikki Groarke Archdeacon of Dudley



#### Another new year - how did it come around so quickly?

Whether you are the sort to make new year's resolutions or not, January is certainly a good time to reflect on what the year ahead might hold, to refocus on our priorities, both personally and as churches together. Having set priorities as a diocese, mapped out a plan for the rest of the decade, it may feel unnecessary to revisit them.

However, as someone reminded me when I spoke recently of our 'nine-year plan', we are now already two years in. There are only seven years left to achieve all we set out to accomplish by 2030, which is a challenging thought!

As a diocese, over those seven years we aim to

- Double the number of children and young people worshipping in our churches.
- Create 100 new worshipping communities offering a range of ways for people to come to faith and worship God. (e.g. Forest Church / Café Church / Walking Church).
- Invest in the renewal of around a dozen churches to ensure that each major area of population has at least one church with 150 people attending weekly, enabling them to support other local churches.
- Underpin these by investing in our clergy and lay leaders, providing training and development opportunities to enable them to grow and feel supported and equipped for mission.

If your church hasn't yet identified priorities to focus on, it may be helpful to do some thinking around some of these. Most of our churches could benefit from engaging more with children and young people, and many could start a new worshipping community. If you want to grow and be better equipped for mission, why not explore the training and development opportunities on offer to help with this as one of your personal new year's resolutions, and encourage others to do the same?

Many churches are working with a Mission Accompanier to help discern what their priorities locally might be, and there is still opportunity to sign up to the scheme, if you haven't yet started on a journey together towards the formation of a Health and Sustainability Plan.

And of course, in addition to that, we can all make some resolutions about our own personal well-being, making space to do the things which will help us to flourish and be content. That may be about committing to more time with family and friends, getting out into the fresh air more frequently, taking steps to be more environmentally friendly, or, in my case, running a marathon!

Whatever you resolve and prioritise, I pray that you will join me in fixing our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, ... so that you will not grow weary and lose heart, (Hebrews 12:2-3), and that 2024 will be a year of blessing for you.

And, according to news reports the gap between the 'haves' and the 'have nots' in our own country is growing even wider. In a recent episode of the rebooted Doctor Who series the 'baddie' sought to bring about the destruction of humanity by exaggerating individuals' beliefs that they are absolutely right about everything, never hearing another's point of view but defending their own perspectives with violent determination not to listen to anyone else.

Following the Messy Church values, our Creativity activities included lots of angel making. Particularly popular with the children from our congregation were the fondant icing angels, made around an ice cream cone – mainly for the edible factor involved!

Sadly, while Phil's excellent example made it through to the 10.30am Eucharist the following day, the angel decided that was enough and fell slightly apart. You can still see Phil's other creations on the pulpit

Alongside these, you may also see our Christmas archway. We were encouraged to look at decorations and Christmas cards and choose which side of the arch we thought it should be placed – secular or religious. Other activities included decorating an advent candle, lolly stick angels and making an angel picture.



Our short worship session, celebrating God, Jesus and this month's message was led by Phil. The answer (in case you don't know and Phil one day quizzes you on it in his sermon) is messenger. We thought about the importance of this role and the messages that they were delivering from God. We concluded with the hymn 'Little Donkey', led by Liz, to mark the beginning of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.

With Messy Church's value of Hospitality, our shared meal was pizza, followed by cake and custard. It was great to sit down and share a meal with everyone. Thank you so much to Darren and Sarah for running the kitchen for us, particularly as Darren had been in the kitchen all morning as well.

*Prayers for Ukraine, Gaza and Israel* 



Let us together light three candles, representing Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; and hold in our hand the woven cord, that we made last month, as we join our prayers together.

Lord Jesus, we pray for leaders of our world, that they may work together to bring about peace in our fractured world. We ask Lord for all leaders to have a greater understanding of what it means for innocent people to have bombs and missiles rain down on them. We pray that all leaders and terrorist groups will reach a place where they ask for forgiveness and repent of all the violence that is being perpetrated.

Lord God, in you we put our hope for change.

Lord God, we pray for all who suffer. The refugees in Ukraine where homes are flattened and people displaced. Where people in Afghanistan flee persecution and travel across the world for a safe haven.

We pray for all those in Gaza, seeking shelter and living in bombed out buildings and tents made of plastic sheeting, with no money, food or clean water and no means of escape from the hatred and evil that surrounds them.

We pray for the people of Israel - praying for families and friends held hostage and for those violated on October 7th and since.

#### Diary management, 2024

From Parish Pump, the world-hardened cleric, Eustace, writes to his nephew, eager curate Darren:

On how to run your Diary for 2024

My dear Nephew Darren

So, you have just attended a course on 'Diary Management', to get you prepared for another year. If you had visited me, I could have told you all you need to know in half the time. Allow me to provide you with useful information which was probably not provided in your conference hand-outs.

First, buy the smallest diary you can find. Large blank pages only encourage you to fill them with too many appointments; the smaller the page, the easier it can be made to appear that your days are fully booked.

### "Joyeuse nouvelle année"

#### 'Joyous new year'

"Joyeuse nouvelle année" is the greeting that our French neighbours say to us when we meet, usually followed by sending a new year card conveying best wishes for good health and wealth in the year ahead. Such greeting can be sent at any time between the 2nd and 30th of January since it is a month of greeting.

January is still a time for gifts too! For your postman/woman it is a small sum of money (say, about 20€) which you give in exchange for a calendar/almanac of La Poste and which has lots of very useful information about where you live - City or town, Département, Région, and a host of places to visit, with maps.

It's useful to have a couple of bottles of either Ratafia, port, sherry, or fine wine (for example Eiswien - a wine made from grapes that are gathered only after the first hard frosts). Why? So that you can invite your neighbours for an evening light meal, known as an Apéro Dinatoire. This consists of a finger buffet, some sweet truffles or other sweet dishes. All washed down by some of your choice liquid offerings. It is also a time when you can exchange new year cards. Always a very convivial time, often helped by some suitable musical offering also.

During the month you are likely to get a visit from your local fireman/woman who will be collecting funds (in exchange for a Fire Service calendar). The funds go towards a special meal that is provided in early February for all the old folk who live in the area (often alone) so that they can share a time of reminiscence and socialising with their generation, often accompanied by some local traditional dancing/music.

Towards the end of the month, it is likely that your local "Pépinièriste" (equivalent of a garden centre to us) will invite you to a preparation for spring event, where all the items you want for your early plantings will be on display (and sale, of course). There is no obligation to buy, but many invitees do so however, and it is accompanied by all the necessary advice on planting, nurture and care to ensure success with your purchased plants.

Finally, it is worth reminding you of the Galette des Rois, which choir members will know well since we celebrate this each year. Timed at Candlemas, it is the preparation of a special gateau which is divided between participants and contains "favours" (fêves) - the "winner" of which wears the king's crown for the day!

Alors, Joyeuse Nouvelle Année!

continues as Secretary and Paul Wilcox and Anne Potter complete the team. The team have been working with the deanery synod to develop a vision for the deanery.

Sue moved to Worcester four years ago from Bristol and has served on deanery synod for the past three years as a way of getting to know the Church better.

Sue said "I see my role as being a lay support to Diane. I want to understand what people's issues are and find ways to support and be a voice for the laity."

Over the last couple of deanery synod meetings, the Deanery Leadership Team have been asking parishes what they think the deanery might be for, what their church priorities are and how the deanery might support them with those. They have developed three priorities for the deanery – praying for one another, communicating effectively and working collaboratively where appropriate.

"We are now working out how these priorities will work in practice," said Diane. "Possibilities include making sure we devote time to prayer in deanery synod meetings, setting up an online prayer group and developing a deanery newsletter and Facebook page. We will also be looking at other ways in which we can helpfully work together across the Deanery."

The team are now looking to put together a more structured plan, finding ways in which they can help people feel like they belong to the deanery. They hope that different parishes will link together to reach new housing developments. They are also planning some deanery worship, for example a youth service.

"The Deanery Leadership Teams are so important for helping to make the connection between parishes and things happening at a diocesan level," said Diane. "We can also be a facilitator for ideas – sharing them so that other parishes can benefit. We hope that all these things will make a difference and that it is a journey that the whole deanery is on, not just the leadership team; a journey that started with listening to deanery synod."

#### CHURCH FINANCES

In view of these appeals it may be wondered by many why we cannot afford to pay for them ourselves. The impression with so many here and elsewhere is that we are a wealthy church. That is not true. The parish of St. John's (that is the thousands of folk living in it) may have plenty of money, I do not know. But the finances of our Church have a different complexion. The truth is that we are dependent on extraordinary functions (Autumn Fayre and Big Threepenny Bit Scheme) to meet our commitments, and they are heavy with the increased costs of Church maintenance and all that goes with it. If anyone doubts this, as I believe some do, it would be helpful and illuminating if they examined the accounts. They are available for scrutiny. The truth is that we shall have to cut our coat to suit our cloth and to face the New Year with sensible expenditure. We cannot afford to bury our heads and common-sense and say that God will provide. That is not faith. That is bad theology. A Bible College adopted that kind of faith not long ago. It became bankrupt and the Principal landed in gaol.

We shall look to the New Year, therefore, not like Mr. Micawber that 'something will turn up', but with hope and expectation, that each member of our Church making his own direct contribution financially to what he considers his Church deserves from him, we shall see ourselves ultimately in a position when we shall have no recourse to 'beg or appeal', or to rely on extraordinary ventures to pay our way.

As a Finance Committee we are also mindful that we hold in trust other people's money, and as trustees of it we are morally obligated to put it to its best and rightful use for the needs of our Church here.
