From Gilly Maxim

The Collect for Ash Wednesday is a call for us to reconnect with God. It marks the start of the 40 days before Easter when we gather, repent, and seek mercy. Often, we think of this period in terms of seeking mercy or forgiveness for personal sins, but this is not just about us as individuals. We also gather to ask God to show compassion by forgiving the sins of others.

The Collect for Ash Wednesday

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent: create and make in us new and contrite hearts that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Ash Wednesday can feel heavy or difficult especially after 'Pancake Day' or Shrove Tuesday, which is a day of indulgence and sweetness and fun. Ash Wednesday, in contrast, can feel like a day of discipline and accountability but more than anything, Ash Wednesday can make us feel vulnerable as it asks us for honesty, it asks us for fearless self-awareness. Ash Wednesday and the whole of Lent calls us to practise that self-awareness, which seems essential for our wholeness and well-being.

We all know that we fall short of the Glory of God and fall short of the Ten Commandments.

Sometimes we may covet, we may lie, we may steal, we may treat others and ourselves badly. We may do this in small ways or in large. Perhaps we covet what we once had rather than what someone else has. Perhaps we steal attention rather than objects. Perhaps we lie to ourselves rather than to others. Perhaps we justify not observing a day of rest because it is fine to not rest so long as we don't take a life.

So, to some degree, we all fall short. I say this, not to make ourselves feel guilty but, as an invitation to search for the truth. Repentance isn't about feeling guilt and shame for our shortcomings. Repentance is about accepting our sense of lacking or brokenness, and acknowledging that healing is needed, and therefore the Lenten practices of fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are not only relevant today but perhaps more needed than ever.

It's in giving up our reliance on those things we don't absolutely need, giving to those in greater need than ourselves, and giving in to God's presence in our lives that we are able to look at our own lack of honestly. It's how we become aware of both the blessing and the brokenness of our human condition. Bonnie Gray writes in her book Whispers of Rest, that instead of struggling upstream, what would it feel to float downstream with Jesus? I read that about six years ago and it is amazing to me how many times it comes to mind.

The dust of Ash Wednesday reminds us that life has far more meaning than our individual experiences of it. Through Ash Wednesday we are given a moment to reflect on and receive a physical reminder of God's grace. A reminder that God is a God of second, third, fourth, infinite chances; a God of forgiveness and limitless patience; a God of encouragement and hope and love; and a God who hates nothing that he has made.

As some of you know, I spend one day a week working as a prison chaplain. In our society, for those who have caused criminal harm, jail remains the dominant response. There are nearly 100,000 people currently in prison in the UK. When I speak with the men residing in HMP Hewell I see that they are broken, vulnerable and in need. And I also see that they are entirely made in the image of God who is loving, merciful, and kind.

As we seek restorative forgiveness for our sins, I wonder what restorative justice would look like for prisoners. A restoration that would provide an opportunity for those who have caused criminal harm to re-establish a right relationship with others and with themselves.

When repentance, mercy, and justice collide it produces healing and hope for victims, offenders, and society. When repentance, mercy and justice collide it produces healing and hope for us all.

Clergy wear different outfits!

When attending church services, you are usually handed a book to follow, joining in with text in bold. You may notice that some words change with the time of year or the type of service, whereas others are constant. Clergy wear different outfits and perform various manual actions. Certain parts of the church are used for certain things. Sometimes we sing.

None of this is random. The services we have, the variations, and the way we worship are all the result of centuries of historical and theological development. Our way of worshipping in West Worcester is not the only way; there is a great variety of liturgical material and ways of using it in the Church of England.

For four weeks during Lent this year, we will look at our liturgy in more depth.

We will look not just at liturgical texts, but at everything that accompanies and supports them: vestments, church architecture and furnishings, people. Our focus will be both historical and theological as well as focussed on the present, looking at how we have the services we have as well as how we devise and use liturgy today.

No specialist knowledge is required, just interest and a willingness to ask if there are things you want to know or explore.

Sessions will be in the Blakefield Room at St John's:

Week 1 (26th March) - Liturgy before the Reformation Week 2 (2nd April) - The Book of Common Prayer Week 3 (9th April) - BCP to Common Worship Week 4 (16th April) - Liturgy Today

Tea and coffee will be served from 7pm, with sessions starting at 7.30pm and finishing by 9pm. If anyone has any queries, please just let me know!



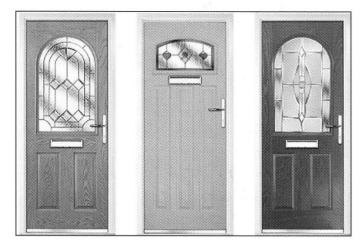

Lent to Easter 2025

In Lent we journey with Jesus on the difficult and thorny road that leads all the way to the cross on Good Friday – and beyond, to the transformation of Easter Day.

The Church of England's Lent theme for 2025 is **Living Hope**.

God invites us to bring to him our own journey through everyday life. In the



disappointment of daily setbacks and the pain of deeper hurts, we discover that God is present with us. And God promises a future where all things are healed and made new.

Living Hope offers us the opportunity to deepen our hope in God and be part of what God is doing to bring hope in the world.

During Lent, the Church of England will be publishing daily Bible readings with

reflections. You can access these in many ways, for example purchasing a hardcopy booklet (£2.50); via the Everyday Faith app; or by signing-up for a daily email.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, 5th March.

This year Children's Church, who normally meet at St John's during the Sunday morning service, will be helping to prepare the ash by burning last year's palm crosses. This ash will then be used at special **Eucharists for Ash Wednesday** at 10.30am at St Michael's and 7.30pm at St John's.

On the last Sunday in March, 30th March, St John's will be hosting a special, non-Eucharistic **Service for Mothering Sunday** at 10.30am with music led by the choir. Recognising that this can be a difficult time for some people, on this day St Michael's will be hosting a **Eucharist for the Fourth Sunday of Lent** at 10.30am.

Our Lenten journey continues into April with a **Service of Music and Readings for Passiontide** at 5.30pm on Sunday 6th April. This can be thought of as a "carol service" in terms of the shape and flow of the service. Like the Advent Carol Service in December, there will be refreshments served beforehand from about 4.45pm. There will be many more services in April to look forward to, about which more details will be published in next month's edition.

Knitted Poppy Pattern

Abbreviations

K = knit.

(RS) = right side.

KFB = increase by knitting forward and back into stitch

Sl1 = slip 1 stitch.

K2tog = knit 2 stitches together.

psso = pass slip stitch over

Poppy petals (make 5)

Using red wool cast on 5 stitches

Row 1 (RS) K

Row 2 KFB, K to last 2 stitches, KFB, K1 (7 stitches)

Row 3 As row 2 (9 stitches)

Row 4 As row 2 (11 stitches)

Rows 5, 6, 7 & 8 knit

Row 9 Sl1, K2tog, psso, K to last 4 stitches, K2tog twice (7stitches)

Row 10, 11 & 12 K

Row 13 As Row 9 (3 stitches)

Row 14 Cast off leaving a long strand of wool.

Centre of Poppy (make 1)

Using black wool cast on 16 stitches. Cast off.

Sewing together

Petals

Weave in the wool strand at the top of each petal; assemble all 5 petals into a circle, overlapping the petals as you go.

Using the lower strands of wool, sew the petals firmly together.

Centre of poppy

Coil the black centre into a circle and sew into the centre of the petals.



The Lord's Prayer

Messy Church's theme for February was The Lord's Prayer. Featured in both the gospels of Matthew and Luke, we took a closer look at the words and really considered their meaning and what we're asking God.





The current Messy Church board scene shows an open treasure chest, covered with gold and sparkles. This was the start of our conversation, as we discussed that the prayer was a gift from God, and that it was taught to us by Jesus. We then went through each line of the prayer and stuck them next to the chest.

Each of our crafts was inspired by a different line from The Lord's Prayer:

Our Father – We made parent and child figures out of pipe cleaners, using beads for hands and feet.

Hallowed be your name – How do you describe God when you're thinking or talking about him? Using Hallowed as a jump start for coming up with more words, we made 'word mobiles' to hang at home.

Give us today our daily bread – This definitely lends itself to the Messy Church name! We used different sauces and condiments to

write the word 'daily' onto a slice of bread – and of course, eat it.

Forgive us our sins – This more reflective activity involved us writing down our sins, or sins that others had done to us and burning them over a candle (with adult supervision!) symbolising God forgiving us, and us forgiving others.

Lead us not into temptation - We made lolly stick gates thinking about how gates can lead us and guide us onto certain paths, and asking God to lead us through the right gates to stay on his path, away from temptation.

Deliver us from Evil – Another foody craft, much to the children's joy! Thinking about how we use life belts to deliver us to safety at sea, we made 'life belts' made from apples slices and cheese as we ask God to deliver us to safety from evil.

For yours is the kingdom, the power and the glory – We celebrated the glory of God through making sparkly boxes.



If you pop into St John's church over the month, you will also see in the North Aisle (as pictured above) the banner that we were making over the last 3 months of 2024. Each third represents Love – Love the world, Love God and God's love for us. Please do have a look at it.

The next Messy Church service is on Saturday 1st March and our theme will be Lent. Please do come along and join us! Doors open 3.30pm for a cuppa, with activities beginning at 4pm. With crafts, worship and food, Messy Church lasts approximately 1.5-2hrs.


Empire Day

Over 50 people turned up on a very cold and frosty January afternoon. Paul started by asking who knew about Empire Day, and there were not many in the audience who did. Technically, Empire Day was aimed at school children. Celebrating it started in 1902. It evolved firstly into British Commonwealth Day and then



Commonwealth Day, which is still celebrated in March.


Anything involving the word empire is no longer a welcome term as it usually meant that a country had grabbed land from a local population and that is why the name was changed to Commonwealth. Commonwealth is more about a common purpose and working together. Many other countries also had empires, but these are not as well-known as the British Empire, going back to the Roman Empire.



The Royal Navy back in the 16th/17th centuries was the best organised in the world. It was very powerful and modern. This is one of the main reasons Britain started to acquire an empire.

Paul showed a map from the 16th Century that showed what the British thought the world looked like.





In the 18th Century the British Empire covered vast areas of the world, and it was said that 'the sun never set on the British Empire'. By the 19th Century we were bringing back many raw materials from the countries of the Empire. This was the main reason for having an Empire, we could improve our country by using these materials.

For example, we could not grow enough wheat in this country to supply the needs of our people. In 1914, we imported 85% of the grain we used for bread and beer. Going back to the Romans and Vikings who invaded Britain, they also both came for raw products. The Romans were looking for metals such as gold and lead and the Vikings were looking for farmland where they could grow food.

The two big staple imports into the country were tea and sugar. Tea originally came from China and the Chinese were very secretive about how the tea plants grew and how to make the tea. Britain was eventually able to find out how and get hold of some tea plants which they took to India, an Empire country, and then grew the tea there.

In 1894, Canada first put forward the idea that we should celebrate the British Empire. Weirdly Britain was not very keen on the idea. The Canadian Government then petitioned Queen Victoria, and they suggested that the day was celebrated on Queen Victoria's birthday. In 1902 the British Government sent out messages to all the countries of the empire stating that Empire Day would be celebrated on Queen Victoria's birthday, 24th May. It said, 'To nurture a sense of collective identity and responsibility amongst young Empire citizens.'

The Union Flag was the key symbol of the empire, and it appeared in all the photographs associated with Empire Day. It consists of the St George's red cross, St Patrick's red cross and the St Andrew's blue. One King, one fleet and one flag was the original strap line for Empire Day. Children would salute the flag, and people would sing songs that would rouse the throng such as Rule Britannia and Jerusalem.




When Empire Day fell on a school day then schools would close at lunch time so that the children could join in the celebrations. People would dress up in fancy dress as part of the celebrations. Some of them would dress as people from the countries of the empire, something that would not be appropriate in modern times. Britannia was a very popular costume, and children would often dress as young sailors, links to the Royal Navy's role in creating the empire.

When we entered the Great War in 1914 it was not Britain who took on the Germans, but it was the whole of the British Empire that did. In the Great War over 1.4 million Indians, 628,000 Canadians, 412,000 Australians, 136,000 South Africans and 128,000 New Zealanders supported the war effort. In WW2 even more from each of these countries stood beside Britain. The wars started the thoughts that an empire was not appropriate. In the 1930s, talks was starting to consider a Commonwealth of countries that worked together and stayed together for common purposes. This was effectively put on hold with the start of WW2.

Finally on 26th April 1949 the British Commonwealth was created and in the early 1950s this was changed to the Commonwealth. The statement included

'A Commonwealth becomes official; countries can join and not be forced to be part of it.'

The photograph issued with the statement only includes one woman, the Princess Elizabeth. Commonwealth Day was moved to a date in March instead of the May date previously used for Empire Day.



As per usual the ladies from the church produced a wonderful array of very tasty cakes that disappeared rapidly during the break along with many cups of tea and coffee.

What's happening with the Vacancy in See?

During January the members of the Crown Nominations Commission (CNC) who will appoint our new Bishop met together to continue to take forward the process.

This group of people will put together the person specification for our new bishop which will be sent to prospective candidates alongside our Statement of Needs and a report from the Archbishop and Prime Minister's appointment Secretaries following their consultation in the Diocese.

It is anticipated that candidates will be shortlisted in May with interviews happening on 12th and 13th June and an announcement in July.

The CNC is made up of six people from our diocese who were elected from our Vacancy in See Committee alongside six representatives from the national Church, the Archbishop of York and the Bishop of Oxford (sitting on our CNC in the place of the Archbishop of Canterbury).

New chair for the DAC

The former Archdeacon of Worcester, Robert Jones, is to become the new voluntary Chair of the Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches (DAC). The DAC is a statutory body of volunteer specialists who give their time freely to assist parishes in the care and development of their churches and churchyards, also overseeing the implementation of the Faculty Jurisdiction permission system.

Most works of repair, adaptation and improvements to churches are considered by the DAC and the committee also aids churches in fundraising and in the general management of churches. As Chair, Robert will lead the work of the committee alongside the Church Buildings Team in the diocesan office.

During his time as Archdeacon of Worcester, Robert was part of the DAC and acted as the committee's Interim Chair during a previous vacancy. He was appointed as Chair by Bishop Martin after consultation with Bishop's Council, the Church Buildings Council and the Diocesan Chancellor.

Robert said: "I always enjoyed serving on the DAC when I was Archdeacon. The work of the DAC is all about bringing together the beauty of our church buildings with the beauty of the people who look after them and the beauty of the local community. Our churches are being used for all kinds of different things and ensuring they can continue to do that in the future is all part of the beauty of holiness."





Let's explore our diocese!

The Editors: Within the Diocese of Worcester 'Statement of Needs 2024' (compiled for the process for appointing Worcester's new bishop) is a page about each of the deaneries in our diocese. We are using this information each month, as space allows, to explore our diocese. Last month we started off with our deanery, Worcester. This month we go north to Kidderminster and Stourport Deanery.

Kidderminster and Stourport Deanery

The Deanery of Kidderminster and Stourport encompasses both rural and urban areas of Worcestershire stretching from the borders of Herefordshire in the West to Droitwich in the South-East.



The symbols show that the deanery has 61 churches and 18 church schools.

A deanery restructuring process still being finalised has created more distinct rural and urban parishes better able to support one another. In the West of the deanery, we are developing a collegiate group working across a large rural area covering 26 churches. This 'Muddy Boots' mission area seeks to relish being rural Christians, sharing the joys and challenges that life in the countryside brings. We hope and pray our learning can inform and inspire others.

The deanery leadership team is keen that all synods have a purpose and have been concentrating on the diocesan priorities and how *Continued on page 41*

Each year the deanery meets to celebrate the Eucharist together and join in



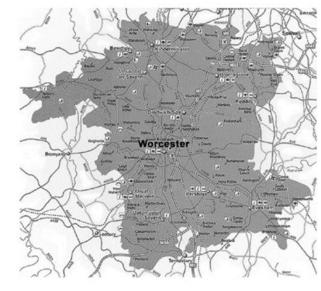

Joint Council (JC) meetings

As I was preparing to summarise the minutes of the January meeting, I realised that there had been no magazine summary of the November meeting.

The main decision taken at the November meeting was to approve an application to the Bishop for permission to admit children to Holy Communion prior to confirmation.

January 2025 - Summary of the minutes

Phil Bradford welcomed everyone to the meeting and opened the meeting with a prayer. There were 16 members present, with apologies from 3 members.

It was noted that a poppy drop for Remembrance 2025 was agreed by correspondence.

The ongoing process to sell the property at Heron Close was discussed. It was agreed to authorise money for work including improvements to the flat roof and the kitchen, plus some basic decorating throughout the property.

It was noted that repair of the boiler in the office had $cost \pm 1,200$.

Terms of reference, and membership up to the APCM, for the Charity Committee were agreed.

Feedback on Christmas services, and preparation for Easter services were discussed. On March 29th (Mothering Sunday/Lent 4), there will be a Eucharist Service for the fourth Sunday of Lent at St Michael's (i.e. explicitly avoiding Mothering Sunday) and a Mothering Sunday service at St John's.

The re-formation of the Events Committee was reported with a summary of some of the planned events.

Phil reported that the Bishop has approved our application to admit children to Holy Communion prior to confirmation. He outlined the next steps leading to their first Communion on Easter Sunday.

Opening and closing of the church building, hiring of the church and rooms, and church cleaning were discussed.

Various practical finance issues were reported. Philip Evans has now handed over the role of the Treasurer. Charlotte Tidder has taken on some aspects of this role, although there will still need to be people to take on the aspects of the role Charlotte cannot do. Ellen Little and Graham Evans are doing the monthly bookkeeping. As it stands at the moment *Continued on page 45*

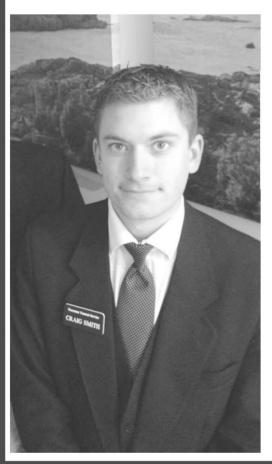




