A Word from the Editors

Welcome to our March 2020 magazine. This year is the centenary of St David's church, and March sees St David's Day, so how could our theme be anything but "St David"?

In her letter, Sarah highlights St David's exhortation to fulfil the small tasks through which we can spread kindness and show God's love and compassion to the world. Lent offers us the opportunity to make a start on that, and our ambition should be to make it last for 365 (or 366) days of the year not 40.

Later in this magazine (page 12) you will see that at St David's we are preparing to celebrate one hundred years of Christian worship in the building in Comer Gardens. Originally the Comer Gardens Mission, the building was dedicated to St David on March 1st 1966, this particular saint being chosen as there was no other church in Worcester dedicated to him.

So what do we know about Saint David?



According to James Bentley (Macdonald & Co Ltd, 1988) David was born in Henfynyw, Cardigan, at the end of the fifth century. His father was a prince named Sant and his mother was Saint Non. According to legend, David learned to praise God, as the Holy Spirit, in the form of a dove, hovered over him as he learned to read the Psalms. Another legend has St David winning a great victory over the Saxons, telling the Welsh soldiers to wear a leek in their headgear so that they could recognise each other on the battleground.

Educated at Ty Gwyn by St Paulinus, David was elected abbot of the monastery there and he is credited with the founding of twelve monasteries, including the one at Menevia, now St David's. David's rule was extremely harsh with speech restricted to extreme necessity, a limited and sparse diet and hard physical labour. The monks were expected to remain awake and at prayer from dusk on Friday until dawn on Saturday. This will probably not inspire many of us to want to follow David's rule but the saint was also known for his kindness and compassion for others, particularly the poor and the sick. On his deathbed, in about 601, David instructed his followers to: "Rejoice, hold fast to the faith. And remember to fulfil those small tasks that you have learned while you were with me."

There's something there that we can all take hold of and should be trying to reflect in our daily lives.

"Rejoice!" It's so easy to focus on the problems we face or the things we consider to be wrong in our lives, forgetting all the many blessings for which we should be thankful. Health, homes, safety, freedom, occupations, friends and family are all things we can take for granted until we don't have them any more. Above all, we should be grateful for, and rejoice in, our faith and our Salvation.

"Hold fast to the faith;" for so many Christians around the world, this is a real challenge as they face persecution and oppression for their faith. We don't face those challenges but there may be others. We all face times of crisis in our lives; times when it may be difficult to hold fast to the faith but it is at exactly those times that we most need our faith; our trust in the God whose will we may not understand; whose ways we may not like, but whose love and faithfulness we should never doubt.

Remember to fulfil those small tasks ... St David was known for his kindness and compassion and we can all follow his example in this. Acts of kindness and compassion don't have to be big. Small things can make a huge difference in the life of somebody else. As I write this, we are just over two weeks from the beginning of Lent. Perhaps, in our Lenten practice of giving up some favourite luxury, we will be reminded of St David's rule of abstinence from alcohol and the simple diet he imposed on his monks. More importantly, though, perhaps we will remember his compassion and kindness and resolve to make a more conscious effort to follow his example in this. Stewardship are once again operating their "40 Acts of kindness" initiative by which, for each day of Lent, people are encouraged, alongside prayer and reflection, to commit to a daily act of kindness for somebody else. Some of the suggested acts are more demanding than others both in terms of effort and finance, but all are designed to demonstrate selfless kindness and generosity towards others. Selfless they may be, but don't make the mistake of thinking that the giver won't receive pleasure and satisfaction from performing these acts. And the really good thing is that, having known the pleasure that performing some act of kindness for another can give us, we go on repeating it; the "one off" act of kindness or generosity can become a habit which continues long after the end of Lent.

At St David's Church we are aiming to make 2020 "The Year of St David" but perhaps that vision is too limited. Perhaps we should rather be aiming – and praying – to make it the year in which that congregation leads the people of West Worcester in growing as a community which rejoices as it holds fast to the faith and doesn't forget to fulfil the little tasks which reflect the love of God and make such a difference to the lives of others.

World Day of Prayer

All are welcome at the Westside 2020 World Day of Prayer Service to be held at St John's Church at 1.45pm on Friday 6th March. Members of Westside churches and our music group will be taking part in the service which this year focuses on Zimbabwe.

As we participate in this service, we are part of a great wave of prayer encircling the globe, which

begins as the sun rises over Samoa and ends some 36 hours later back in the Pacific as the sun sets over American Samoa. We will be joining with people in over 120 countries and islands around the world.

Each year the service is written by a different country. This year it has been prepared by the Christian women of Zimbabwe who call us to "Rise! Take up your mat and walk". We are encouraged to reflect on the difficulties and unrest that have plagued their country over many years. They share the challenges they have met and the hopes they have for the future and invite us to support them as they continue their often-turbulent journey towards full reconciliation.

Prof Michael Scott - Classics and Ancient History Wednesday 18th March 3.20pm - 4.20pm Sixth Form Centre



Michael is a Professor in Classics and Ancient History at the University of Warwick and member of Warwick's Global History and Culture Centre. His research and teaching focuses on aspects of Ancient Greek and Roman society, as well as ancient Global History. In 2017-18 Michael held a Leverhulme Research Fellowship to work on an ancient global history research project looking at the movement of luxury goods between the Mediterranean and China in antiquity. He is a National Teaching Fellow (the UK's most prestigious award for teaching in Higher Education);

Principle Fellow of the Higher Education Academy; winner of the Warwick Award for Teaching Excellence and Foundation Fellow of the Warwick Higher Education Academy. In 2015, Michael was also made an honorary Citizenship of Delphi, Greece in recognition of his work related to the sanctuary of Delphi; and in 2019 he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society.

Michael is also well known for his public engagement and outreach work as a speaker and broadcaster. He is President of the Lytham Saint Annes Classical Association, the largest branch in the UK and is a Trustee and Director of the charity Classics for All. He has written and presented a range of TV and radio programmes for National Geographic, History Channel, Nova, BBC & ITV. He has also presented a radio series for BBC Radio 4 'Spin the Globe', written for national and international newspapers and magazines, lectured to schools and groups in the UK and Europe and has taught in the UK, Europe, US and Brazil. In 2019 he was re-created as a Lego figure in honour of his contribution to Classics.

Notes from the Choir



As you may know, Margaret and I spend part of our time in France, so the editors asked me to write something about the differences between music in church here and there.

The first distinctive difference between the English musical scene and that found in France is the presence of the law of 1905 - the separation of Church and State.

The second is the absence of formal music education in the school curriculum. So all music is taught privately and paid for by those parents who wish it, leading to a paucity of provision.

Thirdly much rural music is founded in a folk tradition which often sits unhappily with a strict Roman ecclesiastic tradition and framework: Mass, Matinales, Vespers, Compline - to which may be added the Angelus (7am, midday, 7pm)

The larger rural churches may have a children's choir, often singing in unison, and a Cantor (male or female) that lead the singing of the Psalms and other major prayers (when sung) plus the responses.

La Messe du Peuple is the most commonly used vocal setting. It is available in four voice parts (SATB) but is frequently sung in unison (using the Soprano line) when there is no choir. This setting roughly equates to our Mass of St Thomas which we use often at St John's, consisting of Kyrie, Gloria, Sanctus, Benedictus and Agnus Dei.

There is, in the Messe du Peuples, a setting of the Credo for those churches that choose to use it and all the dedicated masses include a psalm. Masses always have a dedication/intention - at the behest of a family or families to remember departed loved ones, for which a donation is made to the Intendant (Treasurer) of the church where the mass is being celebrated.

Other services are largely said services. The evening Vespers, which I am used to leading, has a mix of said elements and others which are sung (or intoned): The Welcome, Act of penitence, the Lord's Prayer, Intercessions and final Benediction

are all said. The Psalms (three of them), Magnificat, Nunc Dimittis, Prayer of St Ignatius Loyala, Evening Hymn, Ave Maria and Verses/Responses of the Angelus are all sung/intoned in plainsong.

Everyone has a "pew sheet" so it is all easy to follow. Notice also that in France very few men sing (exceptions being Corsica & the Pays Basque). It is usually the ladies that do so.... hence the dominance of the Soprano line!!!

With the advent of the internet, and YouTube in particular, it is easy to listen to some examples of the various offices of the Roman tradition - search KTO TV for some French examples. Enjoy the differences as well as the similarities!

Martin's consecration as Bishop of Dudley

On Tuesday 28th January, Martin Gorick officially became the next Bishop of Dudley after being ordained and consecrated as a bishop by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, in a special service at Southwark Cathedral.



In the service, the Archbishop explained the role of a bishop as one who is called to serve and care for the flock of Christ; to nurture God's people in the life of the Spirit and lead them in the way of holiness and to proclaim the gospel boldly, confront injustice and work for righteousness and peace in all the world.

Martin was presented for this new ministry by the bishops of Worcester and Oxford. He was prayed for by bishops from throughout the Church of England and anointed with oil by Archbishop Justin. He also received a bible, an episcopal ring and the Bishop's staff that he will use as Bishop of Dudley.

Martin said: "I'm delighted to be joining Bishop John and the people of Dudley, along with all across the Diocese of Worcester, as we discover together how best to be the Church for England in this new decade. As a Black Country bishop I look forward to the church playing its part in the regeneration of Britain's heartland in the West Midlands, and to working in partnership with all people of good will"

At the service Martin was joined by colleagues from Worcester as well as his sending Diocese of Oxford where he had most recently been Archdeacon. There were also other friends and family present from throughout his life. The sermon was given by the Bishop of Hull, Alison White who talked about meeting Martin when he was first ordained as a curate.

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More about Bishop Martin

Martin was born in Liverpool in 1962, and grew up in Nottingham. He read Theology and Religious Studies at Selwyn College, Cambridge 1981-84. He enjoys sport, especially football, supporting Liverpool and Notts County. He values walking, gardening, travelling and birdwatching. He is married to Katharine, who is County Lead for Visual Impairment in Oxfordshire and they have three adult children.



Martin was ordained in 1987 and started his ordained life as Curate of Birtley, an industrial and mining town near Gateshead in the Diocese of Durham. Prior to moving to Oxford in 2013, he was Vicar of 'Shakespeare's Church' in Stratford-upon-Avon where he was also Chaplain to the Royal Shakespeare Company. From 1994-2001, Martin was Vicar of Smethwick Old Church and Area Dean for the Black Country Deanery of Warley.

As Archdeacon of Oxford, Martin had particular responsibility for the churches and clergy in the city of Oxford, as well as being Diocesan Interfaith Adviser. He has held strategic responsibility for growing new congregations of all shapes and sizes across the three counties that make up the Diocese of Oxford, overseeing an ambitious £5 million bid to support church revitalisation and planting, fresh expressions of church and pioneering ministry in major new housing areas. Martin has always enjoyed the Church of England's connections with people and places outside the church, and oversees and supports the work of over 100 chaplains in prisons, schools, colleges, military bases and hospitals.

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PCC meeting

Here is a brief summary of the minutes of the January PCC meeting. A full copy of the minutes has appeared on the porch noticeboard.

Tower Repairs: Alan Simcox (our inspecting architect) joined the meeting to explain the nature of repairs that are required to the tower. Many areas of stone are badly worn and decayed. The string course is particularly urgent (already bits have fallen off). Doing the work piecemeal will cost more in the long run due to repeated costs of scaffolding, etc. A full survey (necessary to invite tenders) will cost about £10k. The whole job could be in the region of £100k. The PCC agreed to seek a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the survey.

Worcester City West Team: Nothing further to report - this seems to be stuck with the Church Commissioners.

Re-ordering: This is moving along. The action group proposed and the PCC adopted the following:

Parish Vision Statement: *"We envisage St John's church as a vibrant hub for the worshipping and wider community."*

Re-ordering project Mission Statement: *"To provide a welcoming and flexible space for present and future use by the church and the community. We want our building to be a meeting place for the St John's community, a place for learning and listening and a place where creativity can thrive as well as a home for worship that can be both passionate and reflective."*

Service Pattern: The proposals across the group will give a Sunday service pattern that does not rely regularly on retired clergy or overload ALMs. Sunday morning Eucharist services will be reduced to two within the Group. The PCC agreed to cease the Sunday 8am service and move the evening services to 5.30pm.

There will be no service on Easter Eve this year as members of the congregation are being confirmed in Worcester Cathedral.

Finance: The Treasurer presented financial figures showing:

- For 1st January to 31st December 2019 an actual deficit of £6.8k
- For 2020 a budget showing a projected deficit of £13.5k

These figures will be shown at the APCM in preparation for a Stewardship Scheme which will start on Trinity Sunday.

Two people have signed up for the Parish Giving Scheme. The system of offertory cards to be continued for those that pay by standing order.

Children and Youth: It was reported that Children's worship is going very well with good feedback from the leaders, children and others involved. Diddy Disciples has 8 regular attendees with 4/5 who attend less frequently. Explorers have 1 regular attendee and 4 less frequent. This group really needs more adult support. Little Lambs is running really well with positive feedback from parents and helpers; an average of 32 children per session with the first back after the Christmas break seeing 43 children. Children from the local community were involved in the nativity and put on a fantastic performance. Parents asked when the next one will be, so we will definitely be doing another one this year.

Welcome and Hospitality: There have been some comments about people showing disapproval with children making noise in services. We need to stamp on this and ensure that children are made to feel welcome and encouraged to be part of our services. Phil asked the PCC to keep an eye on this and encourage friendliness and acceptance. The All Age Worship service to be looked at again, with a view to making it even more child friendly.

Blakefield Room Toilets: It was agreed that the toilets be changed to unisex as there is no reason to have them designated.

The Standing Committee have agreed staff salaries for 2020.

Reports were received on Safeguarding and Health and Safety, and from the Accommodation Committee ('Jobs on the Books'), the Charity Committee (grants made), and the Pastoral Care group.

The Treasurer advised that our letting agents are putting up the share of the rent that they charge us. He hopes to have a proposal for the PCC in March regarding a move to a new, less expensive, agent.

The new Bishop of Dudley, Martin Gorick is being welcomed to the Diocese of Worcester on Saturday 22nd February, at St Thomas' Church, Dudley ('Top Church'). He is being installed as Honorary Canon on Sunday 23rd February, at Worcester Cathedral.

Updated Church Representation Rules 2020: These have been completely rewritten. Phil highlighted some of the significant changes relevant to us. He noted that PCCs in benefices held in plurality or within Groups and Teams can now form joint councils while retaining their own PCCs. This is something St John's and St Michael's could explore in the coming months.

The meeting closed with everyone saying 'The Grace'
